ROBERT McELROY's mill at Grafton is closed down, as all the available lumber has been sawn. He has 1500 pieces that he was not able to get out of the woods last winter on account of the early break up of the roads. With the first snow he will get this out and at once start the mill again. The closing of this mill throws 25 men out of employment for the time. The entire crew will however go into the woods this week to begin a new seasons operations.

GEORGE F. BURPEE made at his box factory at Andover this summer about 9,000 butter boxes, with capacity of 56, 35 and 30 lbs. He shipped four carloads to the Sussex creamery, one to Prince Edward Island, beside supplying the creameries at Woodstock and Andover. Mr. Burpee has supplied over half the butter boxes used by the creameries of the Maritime Provinces this season. Beside this he has sold to the private dairies of the county about 1500 boxes of all three sizes, which shows that dairymen are breaking away from the use of butter tubs and are taking to the use of the lock corner box, wax-lined and parchment-lined, as a cleaner and more convenient form for the shipment of butter.
