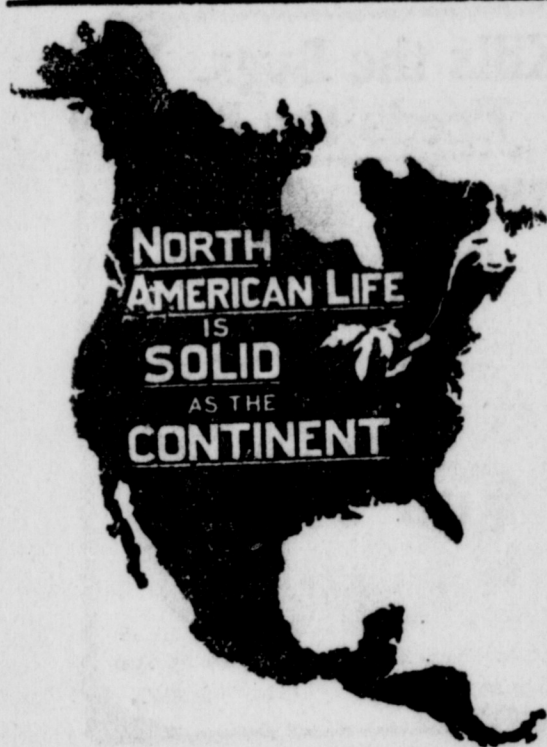

Death of Mrs. Astle.

Mrs. J. D. Astle died at the residence of her son, James W. Astle, Victoria Terrace, on Sunday evening, at the age of seventy-five years. Mrs. Astle was born in Northumberland County and came to Woodstock about thirty five years ago with her husband, who died in 1893.

She leaves one son, James W. Astle, and three daughters, Mrs. Anna E. Tompkins, Miss Glorina F. Astle, of Woodstock and Mrs. A. C. Day, of Lynn, Mass.

Mrs. Astle was a consistent member of the Methodist church and a devout christian woman.

The funeral took place yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock, the services being conducted by the Rev. G. A. Ross. Music was rendered by a male quartette, and Mrs. R. E. Holyoke sang Calvary. The remains were interred in the Methodist cemetery.

As It Will Be.

THE 12th and 13th of August are the days Woodstock throws itself wide open. Thursday evening a company of one thousand voices will sing "The Good Old Summer Time" from the roof of the ice rink, with an effect that will keep Patti from ever springing one of her farewell concerts on this country again, and a letter of regret from Mr. Dooly from being able to attend will close another of Woodstock's carnivals.

TOWN COUNCIL.

Bank Debit Balance Reduced--Scott Ast Committee Appointed--City Marshall Granted Leave of Absence.

At the council on Monday evening his worship announced that the bank debit balance had been reduced to \$2,367.50.

The Mayor thought a Scott Act committee should be appointed, and named Councillors McManus, Dibles and Jones as such committee. Coun. Jones didn't want to act. Coun. Dibles said the duties would perhaps not be pleasant, but he was willing to undertake them and would endeavour to do his duty and serve the town's best interests on the committee.

Coun. Jones said he didn't like the present way of running the Scott Act. If he was on the committee he would endeavour to see that the act was enforced according to its letter.

Mr. Gibson, City Marshall and Scott Act Inspector asked that he be allowed to spend money necessary for the enforcement of the Scott Act. There were some men whom it was not possible to catch in the violation of the law without a small outlay. He was given permission.

On motion Coun. Jones the Marshall was given two weeks leave of absence.

On motion the treasurer was instructed to issue executions for the 1903 taxes.

Mrs. John Sanborn.

Died at Temple, York county, July 25th, Mrs. John Sanborn, aged 83 years and 7 months. Mrs. Sanborn was born in Queens county, N. B., and moved to Carleton county about 26 years ago. She was the daughter of William and Sarah Nickerson. She leaves a husband and eight children to mourn the loss of an affectionate wife and much beloved mother. Five of the daughters of the deceased hovered over her bedside for some four weeks endeavoring to restore her to health again, but all efforts failed, for the Saviour, in whom she trusted for upwards of sixty years, had said unto her, "come unto me and rest," so she fell asleep and quietly passed away. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. Joseph Noble, F. B., and the remains were interred in the F. B. burying ground, Southampton.
