The Bonus.

It cannot be too strongly impressed on the ratepayers of Woodstock that the act of the legislature which allows the town to make a grant to any new industry is a most stringent one, and thoroughly guards the interests of the town.

The town is only allowed to give a bonus 25% of the value of the plant, buildings and land, situated in town, used for carrying on the industry.

The buildings and plant must be complete and the industry actually in operation before the bonus can be paid.

In case any difference of opinion exists as to the value of the plant, provision is made for a valuation by arbitrators.

The bonus paid shall be a first lien or mortgage on the plant for 20 years, after which time if the business is in actual operation the lien shall cease to exist.

The company shall keep the plant insured to the amount of the bonus and assign the policy to the town.

If the company should cease to operate, the town might sell the plant and recover the amount of the bonus.

With all these provisions protecting the town in the event of its granting a bonus, we may be sure that we shall get exactly what we bargain for.

Interesting Evening at the Orange Hall.

On Monday evening L. O. L. No. 38 held a short session. Afterwards the True Blue Lodge took charge, and a nice programme was rendered, after which refreshments were served. Manual Training Courses for Teachers.

The Provincial Board of Education at a recent meeting provided for special three months courses in manual training at the Normal School. These courses are in addition to the manual training provided for the student teachers, and have been arranged to give an opportunity to teachers of rural schools to prepare for teaching this work in their schools. One course will begin on Sept. 8th 1903, and another on Jan. 4th 1904.

After taking one of these courses a teacher should be fitted to teach manual training in a rural school.

There is accommodation at the Normal School for only twenty in each course, so those wishing to attend must make early application. The work will be in charge of Mr. E. E. MacCreedy, Provincial Director of Manual Training.

Travelling fare of teaches attending will be met in the same way as that of student teachers attending Normal School, providing that they afterwards actually teach manual training in a New Brunswick school. An additional yearly grant of fifty dollars will be made to those who teach this along with the usual subjects.
