The bricklayers went into roars of laughter but never tried to work off another joke on Pat.

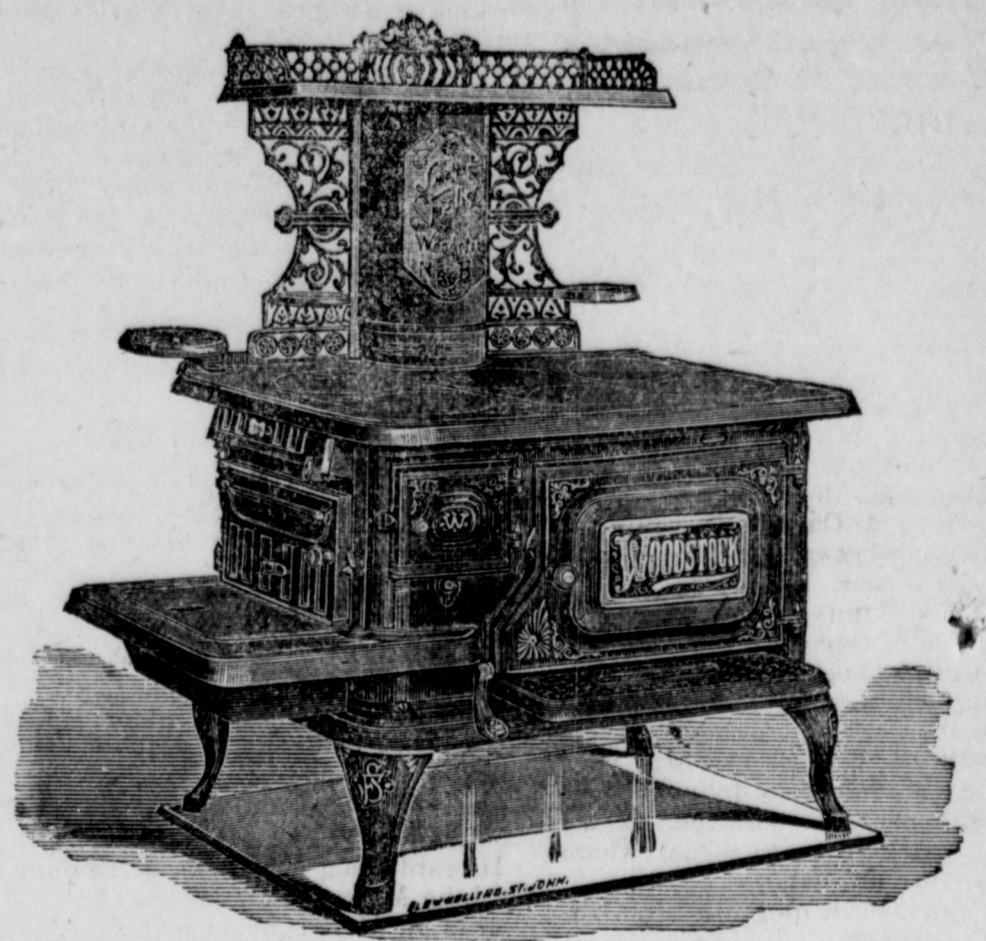

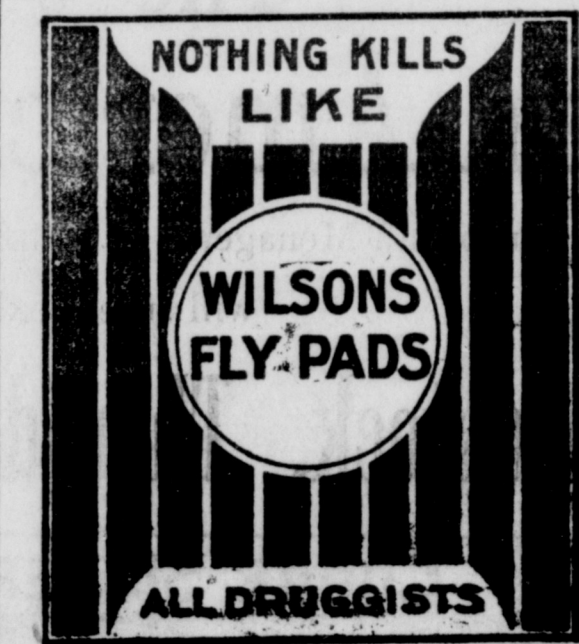
