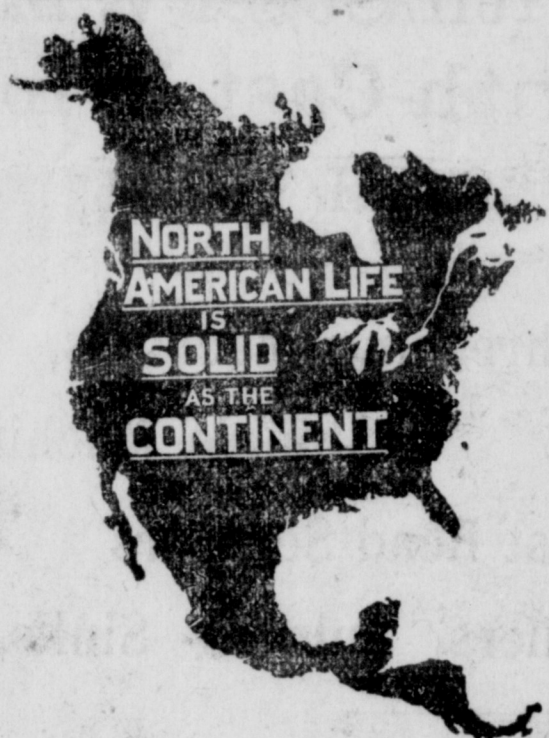

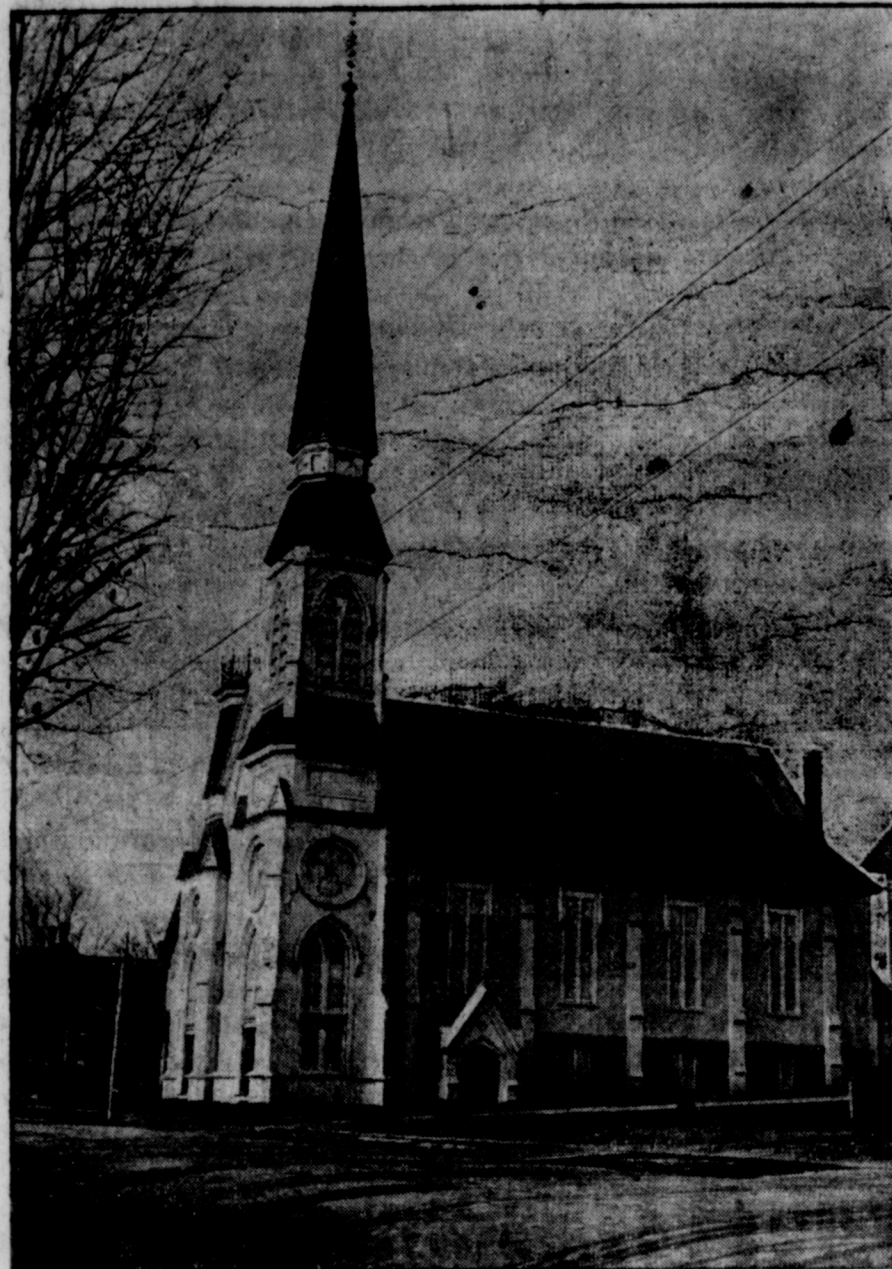

### THE REFORMED BAPTISTS

Dedicate Their Church at Woodstock.—An Historical Sketch of the Building and the Denomination.

Sunday last, June 7th, was a memorable day in the history of the Reformed Baptist denomination, it being the date set for the dedication of their magnificent church edifice at Woodstock.

Woodstock is the birth place of the denomination and the big church on the corner of Main and Victoria streets is its cradle, for it was there, some fifteen years ago, that a small party of the faithful met and organized a society for the worship of God and for the promulgation of the doctrine of entire sanctification.

The first service held at 9.30 was one of prayer, interspersed with song and testimony and was conducted by the pastor, the Rev. W. B. Wiggins, B. A.

At 10.30 the dedicatory service opened with a scripture reading by the Rev. Dr.

founder and building the church, and that, to become a christian is to become a member of the household of God.

We will consider the text under four general heads, viz.

1st. The material of which the church was, and is, composed.

2nd. The foundation upon which it is built.

3rd. The Superstructure.

4th. The purpose for which it is established.

The material in its original state, was widely separated, the Jew in his bigotry, and the gentile in his heathen darkness, which is suggestive of the general nature of the work. The Jew must be saved from his bigotry, and the gentile from his idolatry. So now, people may be widely separated socially, educationally, financially, or nationally, yet by the wonder working gospel they are drawn together and become one in Spirit.

The material was purchased at a great price, even by the precious blood of Christ. This suggests to us the value God placed upon the souls of men. The earth nor universe had a gift adequate to offer for the Soul's redemption, so God gave heaven's brightest treasure as the price of the material for the greatest institution on earth, the church.

All material is utilized; "Him that cometh unto me," said Jesus, "I will in no wise cast out." There is a useful place in the church for every gift.

The foundation, is the doctrines taught by the Apostles and Prophets, Jesus Christ himself being the chief corner stone. "Upon this stone will I build my church, and the gates of hell not prevail against it". No earthly institution can claim so sure a foundation.

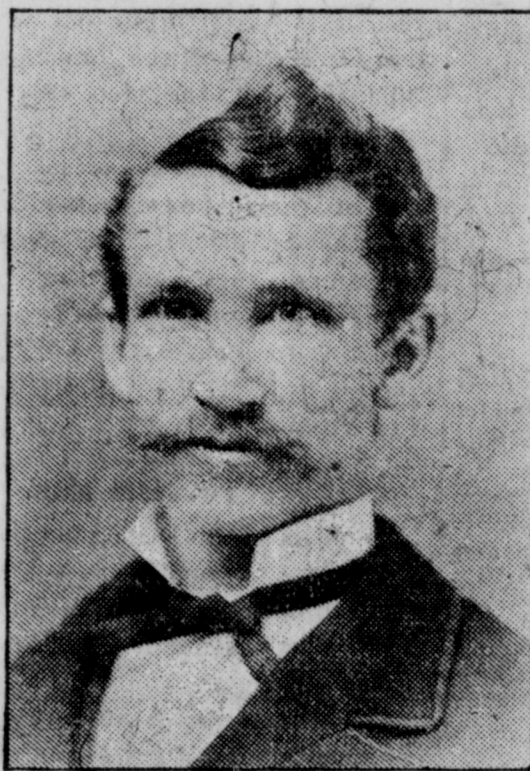
The superstructure fitly framed together, the foundation laid, the material gathered, then we need the skilled workmen to erect the building. This is of greatest importance. First the preparation of the material by sound conversion, consecration and entire sanctification, then the selection of the right gifts for the right positions in the church, fitly framed together, to produce a united church, a growing church, and must be a holy church, unto a holy temple in the Lord.

The purpose for which it is established. An habitation of God through the Spirit. A church is only a church when the Holy Spirit dwells in it. We do not mean the house, for we read, acts 2.2, the sound filled the house where they were sitting, but in the 4th verse of the same chapter we read, and they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance.

He (the Holy Spirit) did not complete his work and retire, as some seem to think, but Jesus declared, He shall abide with you forever, John 14:16.

The work of the Holy Spirit in the church is to produce fruits of love, joy, peace, long-suffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance. Against such there is no law. Gal. 5 22-23. The work of the Holy

Barker, who read 2 Chronicles, chapter 6. The Rev. B. Colpitts then make an appeal to the members and friends of the denomination for the sum of \$400 to complete the payment on the improvement and the completion of the church edifice and to install a furnace. ### TOWN COUNCIL.

Another Good Bonus Proposition. Mr. Henderson Wants to Establish a Furniture Factory in Woodstock.

At the meeting of the town council on Monday evening, the only absentee was Coun. Jones.

Coun. McManus, on behalf of the committee appointed to confer with Mr. Henderson, read the following report:

To the Mayor and Councilors of the Town of Woodstock,

GENTLEMEN:—Your committee who was appointed to interview Mr. Alexander Henderson, regarding the establishing of a furniture factory in the town of Woodstock, beg leave to report that we met Mr. Henderson and talked the matter over with him, and he guarantees to erect a plant that will cost about \$20,000, fully equipped with the most improved machinery with a capacity of giving employment to 20 men (or rate-payers) also he will give work to 10 or 15 boys. The men will be paid about \$1.75 per day on an average, the boys will earn about 75c per day.

Your committee further reports that Mr. Henderson wants a bonus of 25% and exemption from taxation for 15 years. Mr. Henderson's Co., will subscribe to the Town act governing bonuses to new industries.

Mr. Henderson, being invited to address the council on the matter, said he was intensely interested in the establishment of a furniture factory in Woodstock and was going to push the thing through to a successful issue. He had five thousand dollars of his own to put into a factory and he was going to Ontario early in July to confer with some furniture men there and he hoped they would put up the balance of fifteen or twenty thousand. If the Ontario furniture men would not put up the money he could get it in Woodstock. He knew a furniture factory would pay here. We import a large amount of furniture from Ontario, and when we can get our raw material here 50% cheaper than the Ontario manufacturers get theirs it seemed folly not to make our own furniture.

Mr. Henderson made a forceful, telling, address and the council were with him to a man. They realize that it is absolutely necessary for Woodstock to have manufacturing industries if it is ever going to be anything but a country village, and they have shown that they will do all in their power to induce new industries to develop here.

On motion the report of the committee was received, it was decided to put the question of giving a bonus of \$5000, to Mr. Henderson's furniture factory to a vote of the property holders on August 20th.

The question of the pumping station was taken up. The members of the council accompanied by Mr. Munro and Mr. Dunbar had examined the pumps and they were found to be in bad condition. The necessary repairs will be made at once.

### Death of Mrs. Ross Currie.

The death occurred last evening at her home in Douglas, York County, of Mrs. Elizabeth Currie wife of Ross Currie, a well known farmer of that place. She has been ill for about ten days from an attack of that dread disease pneumonia, and her death was not altogether unexpected. Besides a husband she is survived by a family of twelve children, seven boys and five girls, at home at the present time. Her death makes the first break in the family circle. The deceased was a daughter of the late James McAdam of Douglas, and leaves four brothers, David and Charles in California, William of Tobique and Thomas of Woodstock. James McAdam of this city is a cousin. The funeral took place on Monday.—F'eton Herald.
