Rush of Americans to London.
Springfield Republican: A London letter under date of June 21 reports the hotels of that city crowded to such an extreme that some travelers were actually going to Paris in order to secure a bedroom. Americans constituted the mass of visitors, with more of the French in evidence than London knows just how to account for. Evidence of how prosperity has carried our people abroad is afforded in the fact that one tourist agency in London is receiving an average of 1,000 letters a day from Americans asking for accommodations. It is further said that the fine weather, instead of, as expected, taking the people out of London to the country, seems to have had the opposite effect. Fifty persons arrive every day at the Carlton who cannot be accommodated, "not even with a bathroom," and tourists, night after night, seek in vain for accommodations in the long succession of first-class hotels between Ludgate Circus and South Kensington. The stay-at-homes can at least rejoice in being well housed and fed.

Had Tried It.
An Englishman visited an American friend who had an estate in the South and employed a large number of negroes, who were treated with great kindness, but who could not keep their hands from picking and stealing. The visitor attended their Sunday service, after which the negro preacher asked him how he liked the sermon. The reply was complimentary, and Sambo grinned. Then came the remark:—

Swimming Power of a Horse.

"Wash your own, madam," was the curt rejoinder.

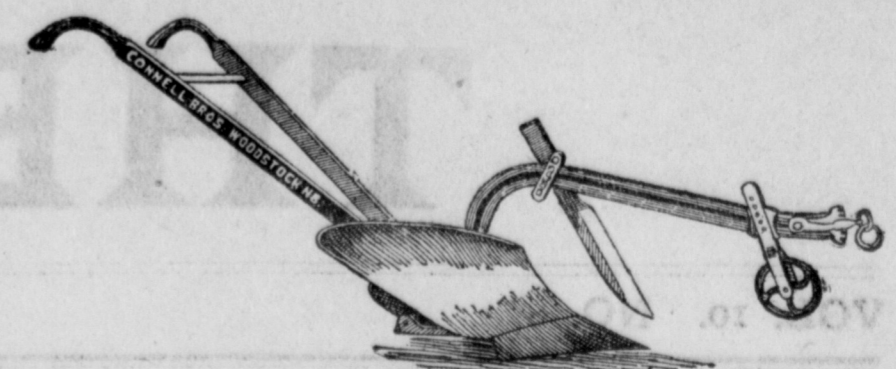
Would be a Serious Thing for the United States.
