Mr. Hubbard leaves today for Andover to address the Victoria County Council on the question of stock improvement and other agricultural matters.

MR. AND MRS. H. J. GILMAN returned to Woodstock on Saturday from New Mills, N. B. Mr. Gilman is back in the harness again at the Canning factory. He has been out in the country looking over the crops and is encouraged to hope for good returns. The corn, peas and beans are short but thrifty and with favourable weather an average crop may be expected. Squash and pumpkins are away ahead of last year. Though this is the off year for New Brunswick apples the crop looks fairly well. Last year the factory bought \$1500.00 worth of these and expects to buy as many this year. Last year the factory paid out at their office for labour and produce about \$20,000, and last year was not a good year.
