The average size of the heads is much better than in previous years.

MRS. GEORGE THORNTON died at her home in Brookton Me., on Tuesday October 26th, at the age of sixty years. She was a Miss Cassie Stairs of Lower Southampton and lived in Woodstock for some years but for the past twenty five years has resided at Brookton. The remains were brought to Woodstock on Saturday for interment, the Rev. W. B. Wiggins B. A. conducting the service. Mrs. Thornton's husband survives.
