Instead of paying these prices, however, they generously paid 16 cts. for both June and July. They ask their patrons for a good supply of milk in the fall months when the price is sure to be up.

ON Friday last a terrible accident occurred at Dickinson's tannery. While John Foulster, the foreman, was going about his duties, his clothing was caught by a shaft and he was whirled around till the men attracted by his cries came and stopped the machinery and cut him loose from the shaft. Portions of the fleshy part of the leg were wound around the shaft. Dr. Prescott was summoned and found that several ribs were badly fractured and his body and limbs cut and bruised in many places. It is a miracle that he was not instantly killed, as the space through which he passed with each revolution was only twenty inches square. Hopes are entertained for his recovery.
