#### TOWN COUNCIL.

Time for Discount on Taxes Extended to July 25th. Grant of \$200 Made to the Annual Exhibition.

At the meeting of the Council on Friday night the time during which the discount of 5% on taxes will be allowed was extended to July 25th.

The valuation of Mr. Albert J. Hayden's property was reduced by \$13,000 in consequence of the destruction of his mill by fire.

A grant of \$200 was made to the Carleton County Exhibition. The question of giving free electric light to the exhibition will be decided later.

Coun. Dibblee for the water works committee reported that owing to lack of funds the water system could not be extended along the Houlton road this years but an estimate of cost would be obtained with a view to making the extension next year.

It was decided that the council could not, and therefor should not revise the work of the assessors in cases where over assessment was claimed.

Coun. Dibblee reported that the pumps at the water works pumping station had been repaired and were now in better condition than they had been for years. He referred to a report in the Gleaner, that during Hayden's fire the pumps could not keep up sufficient pressure. This statement was enincorrect and should be emphatically contradicted as it tended to injure the town.

A petition for a reduction of his assessment was presented by Mr. Henry Upham, accompanied by an affidavit showing that his property of the value of \$3,500 was assessed at \$6,000. The prayer of the petition was granted and the assessors notified of the fact.

The tender of Mr. James McLean to put a new roof on the town hall for \$330, was ac. cepted.

#### Church of England Synod.

The Annual session of the church of England Synod, which met in Woodstock last week was a most successful meeting and many matters of interest and importance were discussed.

The discussion of the possibility of maintaining Kings College, Windsor, N. S., in a condition of efficiency come up. Kings is the Church of England educational institution in the Maritime provinces, and for some years, on account of a lack of funds to carry on its work in an efficient and satisfactory manner there has been on foot a movement to amalgamate it with Dalhousie, but at a recent meeting of the governors this course was emphatically disapproved, and they expressed the opinion that Kings should be kept on its feet. A good deal of money has recently been raised for this purpose, and at college should be given one more chance, though several prominent members thought its continued existence a financial impossibility.

Archdeacon Neales introduced a motion involving the establishment at the University of New Brunswick of a chair of theology. under the auspices of the Church of England. This motion was not carried, though there was a strong minority in its favour. This matter will no doubt come up at future annual meetings.

Though at the last annual session of the Synod there was a feeling that biennial sessions of that body would be sufficiently frequent, at the present meeting this feeling was not so strong, and the decision of the matter is deferred for the present.

One of the prominent gentlemen present during the session was the Rev. L. N. On motion of Mr. J. T. Garden seconded by Mr. G. E. Balmain it was resolved to send the following letter to the Montreal Board of Trade.

"The Woodstock N. B., Board of trade learns that your Board has arranged an itineray for the British members of the congress of the Chambers of Commerce to meet in Montreal during the month of August and it learns with regret that arrangements have not been made to show the delegates the mosc picturesque, fertle and thickly settled portion of the Province of New Brunswick, viz, the St. John Valley, extending from Edmundston, the northern terminus of the C. P. Ry. in New Brunswick to Woodstock and from this place to Fredericton a distance of 175 miles. In this portion of the province the delegates would see the best agricultual lands adapted to mixed farming, dairying, stock raising etc., and this board hopes it is not too late to change the present arrangements, and takes the liberty of suggesting that the delegates be taken over the Temiscouta Ry from River du Loup to Edmundston, thence by C. P. Ry., to Woodstock. where the Board of trade and Town Council would be glad to entertain the delegates for a few hours, when you would proceed to Fredericton etc. The Board desires to emphatically state that the delegates will not see the best agricultural portion of this province unless they be shown the St. John Vailey as above stated.
