The Production of Clean Clover Seed.

The investigation into the conditions of
the seed trade conducted by the Dominion
Department of Agriculture during the past
two years has clearly shown that there is
vast room for improvement. The outcome
has been the introduction into Parliament by
the Minister of Agriculture of a bill to im-
prove the conditions that have been shown to
exist. The bill is intended to prohibit the
sale of any commercial seeds which may con-
tain seeds of such weeds as Wild Mustard,
Penny-cress, Ox-eye Daisy, Perennial Sow
Thistle, Ragweed, Bindweed and several
others; and to provide for the grading of all
seeds sold as either "Grade No. I," "Grade
No. II," "Grade No. III," or "Screenings".
The requirements of each grade are specified,
the basis of grading being the per cent of
pure living seed, and in the case of the high-
er grades, the freedom from specified weed
seeds in addition to those above mentioned.
The grading is to be done by the seedsmen
themselves, but samples may be sent for
analysis to the Department of Agriculture at
Ottawa.

The bill has aroused great interest among
the seedsmen, as should it become law, much
greater care will be required in grading than
is at present the case. A deputation of pro-
minent Canadian seedsmen waited upon the
Minister of Agriculture a week or two ago to
protest against the passing of the bill as
drafted, claiming that some of the clauses
were impracticable and that if enforced would
cause undue restriction and possibly suspen-
sion of trade. They claim that it is impos-
sible to obtain in sufficient quantity seed of
the higher grades, owing to the prevalence
of weed seeds. Many of these it is impracti-
cable to clean out, on account of their simi-
larity in size and weight to the clover seeds.
Much of the seed received from the produc-
ers is vile with weed seeds, and although it
may be greatly improved by cleaning cannot
by any means be made perfect.

The demand this year has been much
greater than in any previous year for the
best re-cleaned seed, due largely to the
preaching of the gospel of good seed by the
Agricultural Department. In fact, it was
stated by one of the leading seedsmen that
as far as demand for good seed was concerned
there had been more improvement in the last
two years than in the previous twenty. Un-
fortunately, however, the quality of seed
received from the producers has not improved.
Should the proposed bill come into force, as
is almost sure to be the case sooner or later,
they are determined to differentiate greatly
in price in favour of clean samples when
making their purchases from the growers.
To a certain extent this is done at present,
but a special premium is to be put on high
grades.

This is as it should be, because there is no
excuse for the production of clover seed foul
with weed seed. The weeds most common in
Red Clover fields are, Canada Thistle, Curled
Dock, Ragweed and White Cockle; while
Wild Mustard, Ox-eye Daisy, sow Thistle
and several others are found less frequently.
In Alsike fields, False Flax, White Cockle,
Sheep Sorrel, Curled Dock, Mayweed and
Lamb's quarters are frequently found. All
of these weeds may be readily seen while
growing, and before the seed ripens is the
proper time to remove them. They may be
either spudded or pulled, and removed from
the field. This system is practised by some
of our most successful growers of clover seed,
and when once given a trial is found to be
not only practicable, but also thorough, fair-
ly rapid, and very profitable.

It may be claimed that to do this where
weeds are very plentiful is out of the ques-
tion; that it would take a great deal of time,
and the tramping would injure the crop. A
field in which the weeds are too plentiful to
be handled in this way should not under any
consideration be devoted to the production of
clover for seed. It is absolute folly to grow
seed which is ten or fifteen per cent. weed
seeds, as there is no surer way of widely dis-
seminating weeds than to have the seeds
mixed with otherwise good grades of small
commercial seeds, such as those of the grass-
es and clovers. To sell seeds adulterated
with ten per cent of sand would be regarded
by many people as criminal, but how much
more criminal should it be regarded to sell
seed containing ten per cent of noxious weed
seeds. In the former case the only injury is
an increase in price; in the latter, the en-
hanced price of the good seed is a small matter
compared with the injury done by the intro-
duction of new weed pests.

It is impossible to effectively enforce legis-
lation to prevent the growth of impure seed.
We must teach the producers to see the
folly of growing anything but the best.
Seedsmen find it necessary to make differ-
ences in price in order to protect themselves,
and there is no doubt that the increased
price for good seed will more than repay the
extra trouble involved in its production. It
is therefore to every farmer's interest to
grow only the highest quality, not only be-
cause it is a gross injustice to neighbour
farmers to continue the production of weed
seeds, but also because he is sure to be amply
rewarded for any increased trouble.

Tribute to Dr. Goldwin Smith.

Nothing more touching and impressive has
been witnessed in Toronto for many a day
than the reception to Dr. Goldwin Smith at
the University dinner. When he rose to
speak he was received with extraordinary
enthusiasm. There was a rare heartiness
and spirit, and a deep note of sympathy in
the welcome. It was a fine revelation of
democracy in its higher mood. Deep down
in the heart of the people there is a great
regard for courage, a sincere reverence for
learning, a genuine love for integrity. Cour-
age and integrity and learning are united in
an eminent degree in the character and
equipment of Dr. Goldwin Smith. Singu-
larly loyal to his own convictions, and singu-
larly courageous in the expression of his
opinions, careless of the favor of the populace,
and scornful of expediency and time serving,
he has yet gathered a rich harvest of public
esteem, and as age lays upon him its burden
of physical weakness, men so gather about
him with words of cheer and messages of
regard that he cannot but catch a forecast of
the honor in which he will be held in the
generations to come. One of the great
scholars and writers of his time, he has
chosen to pass many years of his life in this
new land, and in a measure to forego that
great place which he might have had among
the choice intellectuals and the rich surround-
ings of the Old World. Often his teachings
have been unwelcome. Often he has breast-
ed squarely the tides of our national feeling.
Often he has set our prejudices at defiance.
Through storm and calm, he has kept an even
way, boldly declaring the truth as he saw it,
and leaving his vindication to time and
events. But aside altogether from those
opinions, which, perhaps, not many Cana-
dians hold, he has stood among us for thirty
years, as our best type of the cultured
gentleman, and our best exemplar in public
morals, while his feet have gone unceasingly
upon errands of charity and helpfulness, and
in all our social and municipal and educa-
tional activities, he has counselled well and
wrought with patience and diligence. Hating
noise and ostentation, he has dispensed a
generous hospitality in the gracious spirit of
an English gentleman, and has not ceased to
question the right of the mere plutocrat to
determine social standards and to adjust
social relationships. It is surely well that
we should honor the great and good old man,
set the quarrels of other days in the back-
ground, and rejoice to know, as was so mani-
fest at the University dinner, that he can be
touched by our good will, and is not indiffer-
ent to our esteem.—Toronto News.

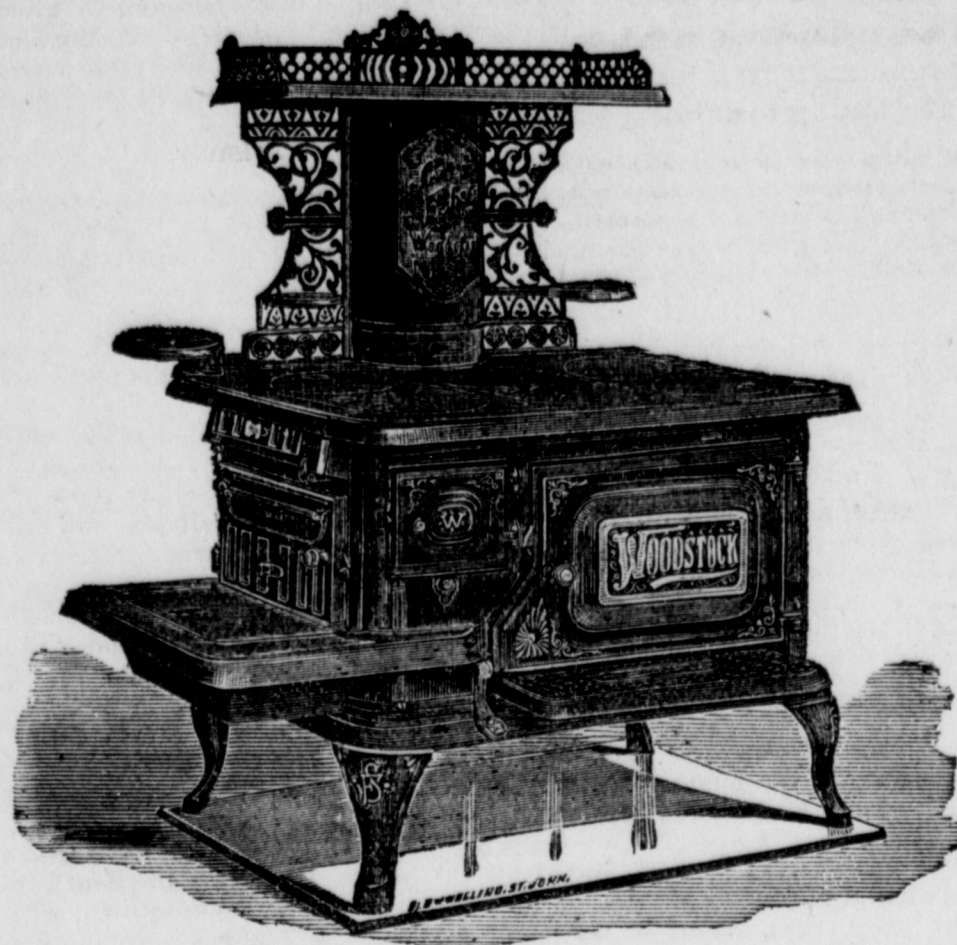
