MR. A. WILMOT HAY returned from Halifax last week after completing the purchase from the Peoples Bank of the Fred Moore mill property on the lower side of the Meduxnakeag stream. There are about five acres of land and some buildings. The location is most advantageous for the manufacturing business which Mr. Hay will carry on there. The lumber for his barrel factory can be cut on the Meduxnakeag and driven to his very door. The moment he can get lumber Mr. Hay will begin the erection of buildings. A crew will probably commence work this week.

THE Rev. John B. Morgan, who used to be the pastor of the Baptist church at Jacksonville has just distinguished himself by the vigorous and successful fight he has made against gambling at Rossland, B. C. Gambling was run wide open on the strength of a deal by which the proprietors of the gambling houses paid \$150.00 a month each into a fund that was used to keep possible kickers quiet. Mr. Morgan who edited a semi-weekly paper exposed the deal and insisted on the enforcement of the law. One of the sports whom Mr. Morgan attacked, one Harry Daniel, showed fight and instituted proceedings against Mr. Morgan for criminal libel. The evidence at the trial showed a most disgusting condition of political corruption at Rossland. Mr. Morgan was triumphantly exonerated and the Daily News, of Nelson, B. C., says he has rendered a valuable service to the community.
