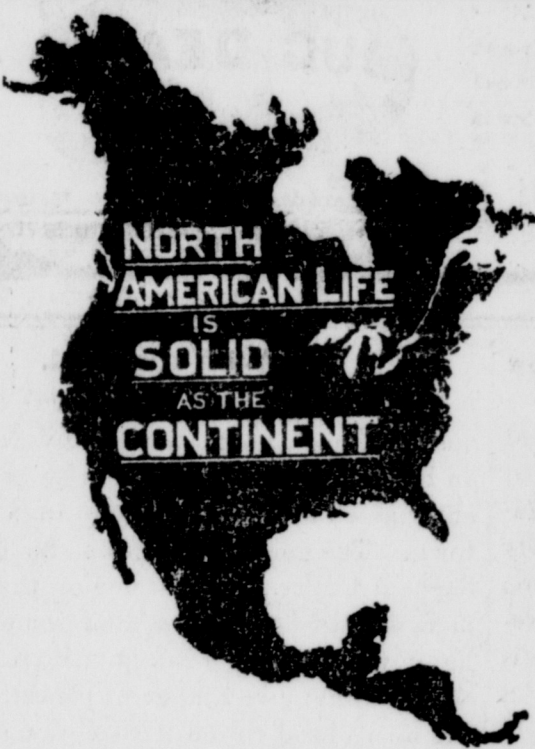

FATHER CHAPMAN'S DEPARTURE

Calls Forth Many Expressions of Regret From the Citizens.—Two Presentations.

It is not often that a gentleman leaves a town of which he has been a resident for twelve years, accompanied by so many expressions of sincere regret at his departure by all classes of citizens, as those which accompanied the Rev. Father Chapman.

On Thursday afternoon a delegation of citizens drove to Father Chapman's residence where Mayor Belyea read the following address and presented him with a handsome cabinet of silver table ware and two richly cut glass water bottles.

TO THE REV. WILLIAM F. CHAPMAN, PARISH

REVEREND AND DEAR SIR,—We are confident that we express not only the sentiments of ourselves, but of all the citizens of Woodstock when we say that we sincerely and deeply regret your approaching departure from amongst us. We are sensible that you have always taken an interest in the business affairs of the town, and that you have been concerned in all that pertains to its welfare and progress. Your active efforts on behalf of the public hospital have promoted much the success of this benevolent institution, the establishment of which appealed at once to your kindly heart and charitable disposition. The work of the young in the schools has been one in which you have shown much interest and your presence at the various educational functions has always been looked for and welcomed alike by teachers and pupils. In all ways we venture to assure you that you have been a model citizen and we do not altogether envy the task that your successor has before him in attaining to your measure of deserved popularity.

While regretting your departure we must ask you to accept our congratulations on your promotion and the genuine sorrow with which we heard of your leaving us is in some degree compensated for by the fact that your loss at least means your gain.

At the meeting of the trustees of the Carleton County Hospital, the following resolution was passed:

Father Chapman from the Board of Trustees, and express our deep and sincere appreciation of his efficient services on the Board, his generous aid in the work of organizing and establishing the Hospital, his valuable advice and counsel in the management of its affairs, and the great interest he has taken in it from the beginning, and further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be printed in the local papers.

Luella Annie, eldest daughter of William Jewett, Florenceville, died at Edmonton, Alberta, on Sunday, Aug 23rd.

Nearly five years ago Luella went to Edmonton to live with her uncle, H. I. Taylor, of Florenceville, in whose law-office she was stenographer. During the Christmas vacation, 1901, she visited her old home. On January 1st, 1893, she married John Howey of Edmonton, who now mourns the loss of his affectionate young wife.

On Friday, August 21st, a telegram was received saying that Mrs. Howey was dangerously ill from cholera and inflammation of the bowels. On Sunday a telegram announced her death. She would have been twenty-five years old on September 6th. Her body was interred at Edmonton. She leaves a young husband, father and mother, one sister and one brother, besides a large circle of relatives and friends to mourn her early death. Because of her cheerful and loving disposition she made many friends and was loved by all. Her old school-mates, neighbors and friends of Florenceville, sympathize sincerely with the bereaved family in their great sorrow.

The Schools.

In the Grammar school some changes have been made in the distribution of the work. Mr. Harrison will teach French, Greek and English while Miss Neales will take the Latin and Mathematics.

Mr. Brittain will teach science and natural history in the grades above grade six, two days in each week, spending a day on the same work at Hartland, one at Florenceville, and one at Andover.

Miss O'Brien began her work yesterday with some exercises in physical drill. In the sloyd work instruction will be given to the pupils of grades seven and eight and of the grammar school. The scholars will be taken in classes of fifteen and will have instruction for half an hour each week.

At a meeting of the W. C. Rifle Club held on Monday evening 31st ult. it was decided to change the day of competition from Monday to Saturday. The next match will therefore be on Saturday, September 5th.

A field committee consisting of Dr. Kirkpatrick, C. Comben, B. M. Colpitts, F. Davidson and Wm. Balmain was appointed to look after arrangement of prizes, etc., and to solicit prizes and subscriptions. J. Fewer, Ed. Clarke, J. Wallace, jr., H. Noble and Rev. F. Currier were appointed a committee.

Exhibition, Presque Isle.

For the above the Canadian Pacific Railway is making special rates, namely: One fare for the round trip going September 7, 8, 9, and on September 10 will make special low rates from all points, St. Stephen to Edmonton. All tickets good to return up to and including September 11. On Thursday, September 10 there will be

a passenger extra train from Woodstock at 6.50 a. m., to arrive at Presque Isle at 10.30 a. m., returning leave Presque Isle at 8 p. m., Atlantic time, and arrive at Woodstock at 11.40 p. m., taking passengers from all intermediate stations.

Maritime Baptist Convention.

The Maritime Baptist Convention convened Aug. 21-25, in the Leinster street church, St. John. It was a large and successful meeting. Representative delegates came from all over the maritime provinces from the 400 Baptist churches. The deliberations were harmonious. The spirit of the convention was aggressive. The past year has been one of advance for the Baptist cause, and it is expected the present will be still more fruitful. The daily papers reported the convention in full. It was fitting that Mr. J. R. Heley, a successful business man of St. John, one of the governors of Acadia University, and a leading member of the Leinster street church, should be honored in the election of President of the Convention. He made an excellent presiding officer, and pushed the business through in a dignified manner.

This convention receives reports of the different boards and makes recommendations for the working of the body. The Foreign Mission Board was able through the secretary, Rev. J. W. Manning, D. D., to report a most successful year on the Foreign field. The work was enlarging, the contributions were increasing. The Baptists of these Maritime Provinces had undertaken the evangelisation of 2,000,000 Telogooos in the north of India. They were the only denomination in this field. The Mission Churches were increasing. The Home Mission Boards bring in two reports, one for Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, and one for New Brunswick. The secretary for N. S. and P. E. I. is Rev. E. J. Grant, formerly Pastor in this town. The Board is taking steps to plant and foster missions in this important and growing field. The Rev. W. E. McIntyre is the superintendent of missions for New Brunswick, and he was able to report the most hopeful outlook for this province. The Board of Education is called the governors of Acadia University. Each of these three Boards is incorporated. The governors were most happy in their report. The first forward movement had been completed and \$75,000.00 raised for the Institutions of learning at Wolfville, N. S. He presented a plan for a second forward movement for the raising of \$200,000 by Jan. 1st, 1908. Mr. J. D. Rockefeller had promised \$100,000.00 if another \$100,000.00 was secured. The convention enthusiastically endorsed the scheme, and gave Dr. Trotter a free hand, practically in his canvas. He was able to report that already 21 persons had pledged \$30,000.00 and by the first of Jan. next he expected the sum to reach \$60,000.00 from individuals alone. When the amount is raised the three institutions at Wolfville will be free from debt, and the university will have a substantial endowment. Rev. T. Troller, D. D., is the popular President of Acadia University; Mr. H. Brittain, M. A., son of Prof. Brittain, of our town, is the energetic principal of Horton Academy; and Rev. H. T. DeWolf M. A., of St. Stephen, N. B., is the successful Principal of Acadia Seminary. The Baptists of these Maritime Provinces are doing a great work at their educational institutions. Last year the total attendance was 300 this year it will be larger. Other committees and Boards gave reports. At each of the evening sessions there were platform addresses of power. The convention closed Wednesday evening to meet next year at Truro, N. S.

ROMEO AND JULIET.
