COUNTY COUNCIL.

Continued from seventh page.

On motion of Coun. Raymond, Couns. Forrest, Bell (Wakefield), and Brown, were named a committee to submit a by-law to rearrange gaol limits, made necessary by the removal of the gaol to town, for next session of council.

On motion of Coun. Bailey, finance committee and sec-treas were authorized, if necessary in their opinion, to borrow from any bank in town the sum of \$4,000 for the purpose of paying school draft or other county charges.

On motion of Coun. Skinner the sympathy of this board was extended to Coun. Lamont in the illness which prevented his attendance at the board.

Joseph McGee was appointed a weigher of live stock for Wakefield.

Coun. Forrest wanted to know who had control of this building. The Carleton County Sunday School Association would like the use of it for their session. He moved that the use of this building be given the association, it being announced that the council had control of it, and the motion being seconded, was carried.

Coun. Macdonald moved, seconded by Coun. Saunders, that Albert Brewer and Dow be given permission to take water from the spring which supplies the court house, Mr. Golding the owner of the spring giving his permission. The motion was agreed to if the parties in question will see to it that the county supply of water does not suffer thereby.

Mr. Hubbard, agricultural agent for the C.P.R., then addressed the members of the council on invitation. He said that it was thought that county councils could do a good deal more than they do towards developing the natural resources of the various counties. The council knew, no doubt, of his appointment as agricultural agent of the C. P. R. The company seemed to think that this province was not making the same advances as the rest of the territory along the line, and that there must be some reason for this, and if in any way they could ascertain the reason and put it away, it was in their interests to do so. It was not a matter of philanthropy with the company, it is business, and we want to see this country develop so their business may also develop. This council was to be congratulated on having one of the best pieces of territory to be found in one area in the province. He did not know of any county where the whole area was so well adapted to agricultural purposes as Carleton County. What are the present conditions in this county?

To an outsider coming in several things he found were noticeable. As a general thing the outsider points out the great absence of stock in the fields. They say where do you keep your cattle? In Ontario they are found in larger proportions to the fields than here. Here we raise large quantities of hay and grain. Now, it would be a good thing if we could manufacture that hay and grain into more dairy products,

more beef and more horses. For all these things there is an active market today. Last year the C. P. R., took away from the County of Carleton 20,770 tons of hay and 153,000 bushels of oats. A good deal was carried by teams to the woods, and considerably more by the Bangor and Aroostook road. Taking the value of that amount 20,770 tons of hay at \$6 a ton it would mean \$124,620, take the 153,000 bushels of oats at 35c it would mean \$53,550 or a total on the C.P.R. trains of \$178,170 carried out of the country.

That amount of stuff, if fed in an intelligent manner to stock in the country for beef purposes, would feed at least 9000 head of cattle for four or five months, provided you could get young cattle put in at 2½ or 3 years old, and you should be able to buy them at \$30. After feeding them for five months at the price of beef last year they should bring \$50 a head, a profit of \$20 on an animal, you would thus have \$180,000 and the value to the soil in the manure. The value of the average hay grown here, mostly timothy, would be about \$4.72 a ton, as manure, a bushel of oats is worth, in manure, about 11 cts. That altogether would make manure at a value of \$116,720, shipped from your farms. Moreover under the present system of farming we cannot continue to have good crops by and bye. Your attention has been called to the fact that we have been urging the claims of shorthorn cattle.

We are just as anxious to encourage the dairy industry as the dairy department of the provincial government or anybody else, but we must realize the conditions. The dairy business has been boomed up and down this valley from St. John to Edmundston, and the people have been induced to breed dairy stock. In spite of this 12 milk cows is a large herd, we cannot stock the farm with a few dairy cows. Proceeding, Mr. Hubbard advised the introduction of Shorthorn cattle. When they were kept here we could bring men from the Northwest who will buy them by the thousand. We have men coming down here who will buy any beef cattle. So far as the market is concerned, we need not be at all nervous about the live stock business. It is stated that the introduction of Shorthorns will spoil the herds for milk purposes. It would be idle to say that Shorthorns are the best dairy cattle. He would not advise anyone making a specialty of the dairy business to breed Shorthorns. What I do claim is that they are a good stock for those who are making more or less milk and keeping a few cows, and who can keep three or four times as many cattle. As a rule the farmer wants an animal that will make a fairly good beef animal and a fairly good dairy cow and the Shorthorn will do this. He then produced a report from Ohio, showing that Shorthorn cows had shown a milk superiority over Guerneys and Holsteins. Reverting to the question of raising beef, Mr. Hubbard said that our cities were getting nearly all their meat from outside the province. Three quarters of the beef that goes to St. John is brought from the West. Our butchers here are only too anxious to buy beef at home if they can get the quality and quantity required. They do not want to have to scour all around the country to find a carload.

This is a matter deserving of some attention from the people of this country.

In reply to a question as to how much stock was raised in this county, Mr. Hubbard gave the following interesting figures:—


Coming to the question of horses he advised the raising of the heavier breeds, as buyers he had written to had all said such horses were the kind they wanted.

Carleton County cattle go mainly to the St. John market, Westmorland cattle to Halifax. Regarding swine there are fewer now in the province than there used to be. To make the business a legitimate one, swine should be sold on foot, and a large packing house be established in St. John. But before the packing house was established, those who would supply the cattle must be sure of the supply of swine.

Proceeding he urged the raising of poultry, and expressed surprise that farmers should allow the sheep of the county to be driven out by dogs. Why was not the law enforced. Concluding he spoke of the need of preserving the forests and advised the county

council to appoint regular officers to be known as forest wardens, whose duty it would be to call out available hands to fight devastation by fire. His interesting address was listened to with pleasure and attention and at the close a vote of thanks on motion of Coun. Kearney was tendered to Mr. Hubbard.

The council then adjourned.

The Lesson of the Forest.

The destructive forest fires that have raged in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Maine and elsewhere during the past few weeks, have caused enormous losses. Not only have vast areas of valuable timber and many homes been destroyed, but owing to the dry and parched condition of the soil from the long drought, great stretches of country have been rendered useless and unproductive for many years to come. A few days ago the writer was shown a piece of land that had been swept by fire nearly half a century ago. So complete was the ruin of the soil that nothing has been produced since but stunted birches and evergreens. Great stretches of country throughout these provinces and elsewhere in Canada are in the same condition—the fertility of the soil ruined for years, perhaps for centuries. No one can estimate the loss suffered by this country from forest fires. Are our people never to learn the lesson which is taught with unfailing regularity nearly every year, and accompanied with great loss, not only to themselves but to their children and to the whole country? Sportsmen and fishermen go into the woods when everything is as dry as tinder. They kindle fires and leave without putting them out, thoughtless of the consequence and the ruin that many innocent persons may suffer from their criminal neglect. Lumbermen cut down trees and leave great masses of brush lying in the woods. Farmers make brush fences near their dwellings or cut down trees, leaving the branches to dry on the ground. It is this tinder of brush wood, that once started in a dry season soon works up a forest fire beyond control and leads it

to the very door of many a settler's house. Going along a country road how many houses we may see close to the woods, and these woods filled with brush heaps or dead trees and branches that only wait for a spark to raise a conflagration that may destroy the labors for years of many innocent persons, or lay in ruins many fair landscapes. What are the lessons to be learned from the ruin that people lament and so readily forget? Evidently that every sportsman or frequenter of the woods should regard forest property as sacred as the cultivated field or town lot; that every lumber operator should clear of brush the district in which he has made the winter's "cut"; that every settler in early spring should clear the woods near his dwelling from brush cut during the winter, and from the dead twigs and branches that have been broken off by the wind and storms; that the children in our schools should be taught never to make fires in woodlands without leave of the owner, and carefully to put out every trace of fire on leaving a camp or forest haunt. Forest fires and lumbermen have left scarcely any trace of the original forests of these provinces. The pulp manufacturer threatens to strip our woodlands bare of the spruce trees of smaller growth. Have we taken any serious thought of reforesting lands by planting seeds or saplings such as is done in the countries of Europe, or shall we look on contentedly until the greed or carelessness of men has ruined our greatest source of wealth?—Educational Review.
