The funeral took place on Friday afternoon at three o'clock from the residence on Connell Street. The bereaved family have the sincere sympathy of the community.

AT THE MEETING of the General Assembly in St. John last week the Rev. Dr. Fraser of St. Stephen's church, St. John, was appointed to the chair of New Testament History and Exegesis in the Presbyterian College at Montreal, at a salary of \$2,500 to be increased by \$50.00 per annum until it reaches \$2,750. Dr. Fraser is well known in Woodstock where he has lectured and preached and he has many warm friends here who congratulate him and the Presbyterian college on the appointment.

WILLIAMSON FISHER ran an excursion by the S. M. Aberdeen to Meductic on Saturday evening. The 67th Regt. Band was along and furnished music gratuitously. The sum of \$40.00 which was cleared over and above expenses was handed to the Carleton County Hospital. The steamer arrived at Meductic about 9 o'clock and intended to leave on the return trip about 11, but the night was dark and logs were running thickly and the captain did not feel it safe to start out till 4 in the morning, arriving in Woodstock at 6 o'clock.

The Presbyterian Manse has been almost rebuilt and the grounds surrounding it graded and sodded. Watson who owned a small cottage next to Dr. Baker's place has practically rebuilt it and will make a comfortable residence of it. In a short street only a few hundred feet long these changes mean a vast improvement.

After a discussion with them on things in general he decided that they were the deserters and gathered them in. An escort of soldiers came up on Saturday and took them back to Fredericton.
