**The Story of the Kohinoor.**

In a recent speech in London Lord Curzon  
of Kedleston, the Viceroy of India, referred  
to his predecessors in the Government of  
that empire as men who "worked between  
an earth like iron and a sky like brass, laying  
the foundations of empire." None worked  
more valiantly than the great pioneer of ma-  
terial moral progress, the Marquis of Dal-  
housie, to whom is mainly due the unity of  
the Indian Empire. As Governor General  
Lord Dalhousie introduced the telegraph,  
built railways, constructed canals, reduced  
postage, and organized departments of public  
instruction.

It is to Dalhousie that the English owe  
their possession of the great Kohinoor dia-  
mond, a jewel of famous history. In 1813  
Runjeet Singh, an Indian potentate, extorted  
it from a political refugee. After the  
second Sikh war in 1849 Lord Dalhousie con-  
fiscated it on account of the heavy debt owed  
to the East India Company by the Lahore  
State.

Dalhousie's latest biographer, Sir William  
Lee Warner, says that the company imagined  
it was to become their property, but the  
Governor-General sent it to Queen Victoria.  
Those were adventurous times, and it was  
only by great care that the jewel reached its  
destination. For weeks the Governor Gen-  
eral wore it on his person night and day.

The tassels of the armet in which the  
diamond was set had been cut off to diminish  
its bulk, and Lady Dalhousie had enclosed  
the armet with its jewel in a leather bag.  
This bag was sewed into a cashmere belt lined  
with chamois, which Lord Dalhousie wore  
constantly.

Two dogs, Baron and Bendar, were chain-  
ed to the Governor-General's bed, so the  
safety of the jewel was insured while he slept.  
As an additional precaution, no one save his  
wife and one near relative knew its where-  
abouts, and it was finally safely conveyed to  
Queen Victoria.

**What They Fear.**

The one American invasion of South Africa  
which excites alarm is the invasion of the  
American (colored) Methodist Episcopal  
church. The American negro is held in holy  
horror by the South African white. He has  
notions in his woolly head with which they  
fear he will inoculate the Kaffir. Lord  
Milner at first promptly shut their ministers  
out of the conquered territories. Appeal was  
made to Downing street, and the interdict  
was set to one side. The American colored  
brethren are accused of teaching the natives  
that South Africa is a black man's land, a  
charge which they solemnly repudiate. They  
are also held to entertain damnable heresies  
as to the rights of a man not being altogether  
dependent upon the color of his skin. The  
South African bar is scandalized at Cape  
Town by the apparition of a colored man  
from Trinidad duly qualified to practice as a

barrister. He completed his studies in Eng-  
land. Mr. Sylvester Williams, for that is  
his name, ignores their protests, obtains  
clients, and is building up a very good pro-  
fessional practice. A full-fledged barrister in  
a dark skin is a concrete negation of the  
popular theory that black men are fit for  
nothing but to be hewers of wood and draw-  
ers of water. But race prejudice is very  
strong. It prevents the co-education of black  
and white, and it banishes colored communi-  
cants from the Lord's table at which white  
Christians partake of the sacrament.

"The best thing for South Africa," said to  
me a highly educated Malay doctor in Cape  
Town, whose skin is as fair as that of most  
British South Africans, "would be for every-  
body to become Mohammedan. Islam is the  
only religion which is sufficiently religious to  
destroy race prejudice. The color difficulty  
would disappear if you substituted the Koran  
for the New Testament. In the presence of  
Allah all men are equal. Black and white,  
slave and sultan, meet in the mosque on a  
footing of absolute equality." The Moslems  
are not conducting any active propaganda in  
South Africa; but the Malays adhere tenaci-  
ously to the faith of the Arabian apostle, and  
they are gathering around them a few con-  
verts of European nationality.

**Shifting Balance in World's Wealth.**

World's Work says that a conservative  
guess at the amount of English capital in-  
vested abroad is twelve to fifteen billions of  
dollars. Germany has perhaps five billions  
and France has as much or more, of which  
perhaps, two billions are lent to Russia.  
These have been the great lending countries  
heretofore, but the United States is rapidly  
becoming a factor in the world's finance. In  
1850 the wealth of the United States was  
estimated at seven billions of dollars; in 1870  
at thirty billions; in 1880, at forty-two billions  
in 1890, at sixty-five billions; and in 1900,  
ninety-four billions. The most significant  
fact in connection with the growth of the  
wealth of the United States is that this  
wealth is becoming more generally distributed  
over the country as the years pass. A few  
years since the moneyed men of the Union  
were mainly centered in the East, but to-day  
the South and West are able to largely fi-  
nance their own undertakings without call-  
ing upon New York and Boston. As the money  
stores of the latter increase, and the financial  
independence of the South and West de-  
velops, the United States will follow the lead  
of Britain, France, and Germany in becom-  
ing a creditor nation.
