Lord Rosebery on Books to Read and Buy.

The Earl of Rosebery, in opening the new Carnegie free library at West Calder, Midlothian, the other day, discoursed on books worth reading, and complained that many of the best of them had fallen into neglect.

That knowledge is power, said Lord Rosebery, is a great truth, but it is not the whole truth.

Knowledge is power, but that does not necessarily mean book knowledge: book knowledge is only a part of the knowledge that constitutes power.

The man of vigorous life among men will beat the man of books always and at everything in this world.

Reading is only a partial aid to that knowledge of life which makes the perfection of mankind. You should have your hours of study, but should not, for your hours of study, neglect your hours of action.

The great difficulty that lies before every man of energy in this world is to adjust the balance between his life of study and his life of action.

When the object is to refresh and to exalt, to lose the cares of this world in the world of imagination, then the book is more than a means. It is an end in itself. It refreshes, exalts and inspires the man.

And the best of that refreshment is that it does not require the assistance of whiskey or any other stimulant. Alcohol is incompatible with this refreshment. A quiet pipe is a different thing. It may aid not immaterially in the process to which I wish to lead you.

But there should be an index, free from all private influence of authors and publishers, to tell what are the books you ought to read and the books you ought to buy, which are not by any means the same thing.

There are two further classes of books—the books you borrow and return, and the books you borrow and do not return.

The non-return of books has ended more friendships and terminated more affections than any other cause of which I am cognizant.

The man who borrows one volume of a set of volumes and never returns it is a man who should be treated like vermin—trapped or shot on sight.

My ideal index is that which tells the best book to read on any subject, but my fear is that you will get nobody to frame such an index, because his life would not be safe.

In literature we need one who will act the part of the muezzin on the tower of the mosque, summoning faithfully Moslems to prayer—one who will raise his voice and recall the names of good books and good authors which stand in danger of being forgotten, such as Sydney Smith.

**The Irish Potato Crop.**

A London salesman, writing to The Pall Mall on the subject of potatoes in Ireland says: I noticed in your issue of the 23rd

inst. you speak of a potato famine in Ireland, especially on the west coast. It seems to me that your correspondent is not very well versed in matters appertaining to the potato crops. This season in County Down there is a huge crop and up to date potatoes, which are large croppers can be bought for 43s a ton in bags on board steamer, and no doubt for a big offer considerably less would be taken. The freight from this district to the west coast can only be a few shillings per ton, and say these potatoes work out 53s a ton delivered on the west coast they come out at the rate of over 3lbs per penny. Lonsdale potatoes are even cheaper and in Scotland, where there is also a gigantic crop, they are equally cheap, with a low sea freight and yet one is told there is a potato famine.
