Six People Burned to Death.

A shocking fatality occurred at Douglas, six miles above Fredericton, at an early hour on Sunday morning, when the residence of Alfred Jewett, a leading farmer of that place, was destroyed by fire and six people including his three children were burned to death. Mr. and Mrs. Jewett, the only inmates of the house who escaped are badly burned. The victims were:—Edward Clarke, of Caverhill, aged 62; Mrs. Edward Clarke, aged 58; Miss Mary Clarke, aged 15; Zella Jewett, aged 15; Wesley Jewett, aged 12; Ethel Jewett, aged 6.

Of the eight persons in the house when the fire broke out, Mr. Jewett and his wife alone escaped, and both are now under the doctor's care.

Town Council.

The regular meeting of the town council was held on Monday evening, all present but Couns. Jones and Gallagher. There was quite a little time over a statement made by a man named Estey to the effect that there had been a "rake off" in the purchase of some hose. It seems Estey represented one company and from another concern the hose was bought. It appears that the latter firm threw in the sliding pole for the fireman, and this was supposed to constitute the rake off. Chief Tattersall was heard, he contended that the hose was purchased simply because it was the better of the two offered. The matter then dropped.

Mr. Colpitts submitted a written charge against Nightwatchman McCarron, for the manner in which he arrested one Thompson a Scott Act Witness.
