Get Rid of the Crooked.

The lowering of the flag of the old Conservative party in this province, whether the rank and file concur in it or not, and the very poor showing of the Conservatives in Canada as a whole, seems to seat the Liberals too firmly on the throne. A party so strongly entrenched never fails, as the Quebec Conservatives are calculating, to breed an opposition within itself, and there are not lacking signs of a fissure in the Liberal ranks. In the natural order of things such a fissure should develop between the patriots and the practical politicians, with whom the Liberal party is unfortunately to some extent infested. Till now that party has felt itself more or less at the mercy of men who were in politics for self-aggrandizement, and even of the paid agents of money combinations. These are usually of the cleverest, and they never lack the sinews of war. Such men have grown rich under the aegis of a party which owes its existence largely to the protest which the solid people of the country made against other regimes of dishonesty. It is said that there is going to be a considerable shaking off of such encumbrances in Ontario, where, by reason of them, what was once called the Reform party has been reduced to a pitiful plight. In this province there would seem to be in the choosing of candidates, a sort of throttling match between the candidates with boundless money to spend and those who respect the interests of the people. Fortunately, in spite of aberrations, the ruling spirit in the party is one of true patriotism. There is the desire to relieve itself, if it can, of these parasites, who are far more dangerous even to its practical success than the most powerful opposition. There could be no more wholesome dividing line in politics than that between patriotism and selfishness, and it is to be hoped that if there is to be a fissure it will have one thoroughly clean side to it. It would be of comparatively little odds to the country which side got uppermost in the first bout, so long as good and true citizens had one thoroughly clean political party to which to cleave—one whose attitude towards public responsibility might be held up before the young men of the land as a model and a guide to their aspirations.—Montreal Witness.

Campaign Advertising.

William L. Douglas of Brockton, Mass., the famous shoe manufacturer, who was elected on the Democratic ticket as governor of Massachusetts, tried a novel campaign scheme. Instead of depending upon speakers and the usual methods of educating voters, Mr. Douglas spent, it is said, thousands of dollars in newspaper advertising. Papers of both parties were used, and the arguments for the Democratic side were printed as paid matter, with a certainty that they would reach more voters than would be reached by
