ALLEN ROGERS of Woodstock returned on Saturday from a three months visit to the Pacific Coast.

W. W. SHAW'S saw mill at Hartland was destroyed by fire on Monday morning.

THERE will be a golf tournament, four rounds, medal play, on the links on Friday and Saturday next.

AARON PERRY M. A. has resigned his position in the Broadway school. He will probably go to Chicago University this fall.

ALEX STRATTON, T. J. Carter and Thomas Lawson, Barristers, of Andover, and Thane M. Jones, Barrister, of Hartland, were in town last week on professional business.

ED. PORTER has sold his farm two miles above Meductic, at the mouth of the Benton road, to his nephew, Avon Porter. Mr. Porter is buying a farm in the town of Houlton.

THE Rev. J. S. A. Bastin and wife returned by the Aberleen on Thursday evening from Temperance Vale where they had been spending a few days on their way from St. John. Mr. Bastin, while somewhat better, was not sufficiently well to take his services on Sunday.

MICHAEL WELSH the well known lumberman of Bristol says there has been a good deal of rain on the Miramichi of late and the drivers are making good progress. Of a total cut of between 60 and 70 millions he thinks about eight millions will be hung up. The drives in the Southwest are all in the corporation limits. Most of the lumber likely to be hung up was cut on the head waters of the Northwest.

CAPT. MARSHALL District Staff Adjutant of No. 8 Military District was in town on Monday and Tuesday looking over the armories. He left for Florenceville on yesterday's express to inspect armories in that vicinity. Capt. Marshall desires to see a Cader Corps established at Woodstock and while here he had an interview with the school board and with officers of the Militia with a view to getting such a corps started.

THE Woodstock Field Battery goes into camp at Woodstock on Monday June 30th. Major Good in command with Capt. F. B. Carvell and Lieutenants C. H. Good and A. W. Fields, Surgeon Mayor W. N. Hand and Veterinary Surgeon H. Pugsley. The establishment in other years was 102 men and 50 horses. This year the strength is 118 men. The men will be notified by Battery Order when the uniforms will be issued.

At the annual sports at the University of New Brunswick on Victoria Day Fred Squires of Bath won the championship belt for the most points. He won first place in the 100 yards dash, 220 yards dash, quarter mile run, hop step and jump, and running broad jump, and second place in the running high jump. He broke the record in the running broad jump. A glance at the records shows that Neville Vince still holds the record for the running high jump at 5ft 6 inches.

THE Rev. J. Cooper Robinson, missionary in Japan, will visit the parishes in the Deanery of Woodstock next week. He will deliver lectures and preach. He will be at Andover on Tuesday, May 31st; Florenceville, Wednesday, June 1st; Centreville, Thursday, June 2nd; Canterbury, Friday, June 3rd; Woodstock, Saturday and Sunday, June 4th and 5th. Mr. Robinson will give a lecture illustrated by lantern in the Parish Hall on Saturday, June 4th, at 8 p. m., and will preach in St. Luke's church on Sunday, June 5th at 11 a. m. There will be a collection on Saturday evening in the Parish Hall for Canadian Missions including the foreign field.

MISS CHARLOTTE E. WIGGINS of Toronto will lecture in L. E. Young's Hall on Tuesday afternoon June 7th at 3 o'clock on "The Home and The State." In the evening at 7.30 she will lecture in the Methodist church on "The Twentieth Century Crusade." The lectures will be under the auspices of the W. C. T. U. A silver collection will be taken at each meeting. The *Albion Gazette* says concerning Miss Wiggins:—"The address of the evening, however, was that given by Miss Wiggins, of Toronto, which was really an excellent one. It was delivered with ease, and with an absence of too much of the emotional element. Miss Wiggins made her points logically and consecutively, interspersed with some dry humor. Whether her hearers agree with all her conclusions or not, no one can listen to Miss Wiggins without admiring both her ability and her courage, as well as the ability and moderation she shows in presenting her arguments."
