The Carnival.

The Summer Carnival and Old Home Celebration opens next Tuesday morning. The programme which has been pretty well arranged will be about as follows:—

Tuesday morning, 10.30—Grand Manufacturers and Trades Procession and Polymorphian parade, forming at Elm street. All floats from the south side of the bridge are requested to proceed to Elm street by way of Connell and Green streets. Floats will be arranged in their positions by a mounted committee. The route of the parade will be from Elm street down main to the Lower Corner, west to Broadway, along Broadway to Main street, up Connell to Green, out Chapel to Main and up Main to Elm, where the parade will dismiss. Immediately after the parade Prof. Morrell will give a performance on the tight wire above the square.

Tuesday afternoon, 2 p. m.—Races on the track. The entries for these races are given on another page of this issue. Band concert in the square.

Tuesday evening, 7.30 to 9.30—Band concert in the square and performance by Prof. Morrell on the tight wire. 9.30—Grand illumination and band concert on the river. A prize of \$5.00 is offered for the best illuminated canoe, boat or float.

Wednesday morning, 10.00—Ball game at the park between the Tartars of Fredericton and the Colts. 12.30—Performance in the square by Prof. Morrell.

Wednesday afternoon, 2 p. m.—Races at the track. Band concert in the square.

Wednesday evening, 7.30 to 9.30—Band concert in the square during which Prof. Morrell will give a final exhibition on the tight wire. 9.30—Grand torch light procession.
