**The Beet-Sugar Industry.**

The latest results from the beet-sugar in-  
dustry in Ontario show that the Province is  
exceptionally suited to its development.  
During the past year the beets consumed in  
the Berlin factory have averaged, by analysis  
over fifteen per cent. of sugar. This is the  
highest average yielded by beets in any part  
of the world, with the exception of the irri-  
gated lands on the Pacific slope. There the  
control of moisture by the irrigation ditches  
enables the cultivators to regulate the growth  
of their crop, while the alternation of cold  
nights and warm days is favorable to the

production of sugar. But even this crop,  
though showing a higher percentage of sugar  
by analysis, does not make as good a yield as  
the beets grown in Ontario. The relative  
purity more than counteracts the higher per-  
centage of sugar in western beets when both  
are submitted to the practical test of the  
factory. The average yield last year in the  
Berlin factory was 246,6 pounds of sugar per  
ton. The total output of the factory was  
about 7,000,000 pounds of sugar from 28,240  
tons of beets, these being purchased at prices,  
according to sugar contents, averaging over  
\$5 per ton.

The extent to which the beet has supersed-  
ed the cane in sugar production speaks well  
for the future of the industry, especially  
when the soil and climate of Ontario are so  
well adapted for producing the raw material.  
It is roughly estimated that about 75 per cent  
of the sugar used in Canada is from beets. In  
1903 the raw cane sugar imported largely for  
refining in Canadian factories aggregated  
about 68,800 tons, which is far below the  
total import of raw beet sugar from Germany  
alone. The beet-sugar imports for refining  
were about 98,000 tons, and this, with the  
domestic production, makes up the bulk of  
our sugar supply. By chemical analysis the  
crystallized or granulated sugars from cane  
and beet are identical. In the coarser or  
raw products the cane can be better utilized  
for domestic purposes, and comparisons in-  
stituted are apt to be misleading. The chief  
use of the by-products of beet-sugar factories  
is found in cattle-feeding, and already there  
is a demand from stock-owners greater than  
the factories can meet. There were naturally  
on array of unforeseen difficulties to be over-  
come in the establishment of beet-sugar fac-  
tories in Ontario. But, with all the natural  
conditions favorable, the industry should ful-  
fill all the hopeful predictions of its founders.

replied a youthful voice from the corridor.

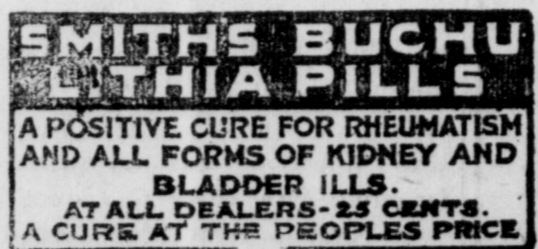
The man was up in an instant; he opened
