On Friday afternoon the election of officers resulted as follows:

President, H. F. Perkins, B. A., Hartland; Vice-President, Miss Evangeline Kinney, Bristol; Secretary, G. H. Harrison, Woodstock.

After the opening address by the president, addresses were made by Messrs. T. B. Kidner, Percy R. Hayward, H. F. Perkins and John M. Keefe. Mr. I. N. Draper spoke of the value of the Teachers' Union, but suggested some amendments to the schedule of salaries set forth by the Union.

Inspector F. B. Meagher addressed the Institute from the point of view of the Inspector, afterwards going into the movement toward the consolidation of school districts, a movement which has his hearty sympathy. The advantages of consolidation are being abundantly demonstrated today in the magni-

ficient school at Kingston and will be further demonstrated in the consolidated school which it is expected will be opened at Florenceville next fall.

Mr. W. M. Crawford who has just returned from a course in nature study in the McDonald Institute at Guelph, read a very interesting paper on ferns, the discussion of which was opened by Mr. I. N. Draper.

Mr. T. B. Kidner, provincial director of Manual Training addressed the institute on his subject and after speaking of the field of usefulness and success open to teachers in this line showed that elementary lessons in manual training might be given by teachers who had received very little instruction in it themselves.

Miss Gertrude O'Brien and Miss Marion Tompkins followed Mr. Kidner and spoke in an interesting manner of manual training from the point of view of those engaged in the work and Inspector Meagher and Principal Harrison discussed it from the point of view of enthusiasts who appreciated it for itself and had seen the value of its influence on other departments of school work.

Mr. Rex R. Cormier, principal of the Superior School at Hampton and the teacher of the primary department in that school who gives instruction in manual training also discussed Mr. Kidner's address.

Votes of thanks were passed to retiring president, C. H. Gray and other officers, and resolutions of regret that Mr. Brittain was unable to be present and read the paper he had prepared for the Institute.

The next annual meeting will be held in Woodstock.

Big Sussex Deal in Which Woodstock is Interested.

One of the largest business deals in the history of Sussex has just been successfully carried through. It results in the amalgamation of the cold storage and packing interests of the Sussex Packing Company, Limited, with the fruit and vegetable canning and preserving business owned and conducted at Sussex, Sheffield and Woodstock by the D. W. Hoegg Company, under the name of the first mentioned concern and with a capitalization, for the present of \$100,000.

Plans for the necessary additions and alterations to the present packing plant are already well in hand and therein will be placed the most modern canning machinery available.

The policy of the big company will be to carry on the same work as has heretofore been done by each separately, and it is estimated that the saving in costs of operation, sales and management will be full compensation for the work of merging. In addition a full line of canned meats will be placed on the market.

As large and continuous employers of labor the combined interests have many advantages which will be thoroughly appreciated by the time they have run a full season, and a capacity and equipment the present concern will compare with any. It is calculated that by using the canning factory wastes for finishing a few cars of early hogs, the packing season can be opened several days sooner and by putting the tankage from the packing plant out among the farmers who contract for supplies, to secure for them larger yields an higher quality product, especially in corn and tomatoes.

George W. Hoegg, for twenty years manager of the D. W. Hoegg Company, joins the directorate and will be actively connected with the business twelve months in a year.

The Kind That Pays.

The politician is almost as active in seeking publicity as the press agent for an actress. Paid advertising is supplanting free political notices in some parts of the country. In Moline, Ill., during the campaign, the Evening Mail printed all political notices from the candidates themselves as paid display advertising, with the result that there was plenty of white space around what the candidate had to say and it had a good showing. Paid political advertising ought to be effective for the same reason that free reading notices were ineffective to advertise the St. Louis Exposition. Secretary Stevens, of the World's Fair, said people read newspapers for information, but only display advertising will convince them and lead them to act.
