The trustees and teachers of the day school recognizing the relation of day and Sunday school allowed the scholars to come in a body to the afternoon session. Mr. Day addressed the convention and a song especially for children was sung.

The evening session opened with a praise service. Rev. J. C. Berrie told of means to promote better use of the Bible in Home Department work, supplemental lessons, teachers meetings, and in Sunday school classes. The County Treasurer, Miss A. S. Calder, gave her report. This was the best and most encouraging report given at a county convention for years. The report will be given in at a latter issue of this paper.

Rev. Geo. A. Ross in a few well chosen remarks gave the secretary-treasurer great credit for work and moved that Miss Calder be allowed the sum of \$20.00 to reimburse herself for the great amount of labour she has to do. The motion was seconded by Rev. D. Fiske and carried.

Mr. Day addressed the convention. His subject being "Evangelization by and in the Sunday School." This was a thought stirring address. Teachers were urged to look for conversions among their scholars. The Sunday school was the recruiting ground of the church.

The resolution committee submitted the following report:—

REPORT OF RESOLUTION COMMITTEE.

1. That this convention would urge upon all superintendents of Sunday Schools as well as all officers, the importance of keeping in touch with the County officers so that the exact condition of each school's needs may be fully understood and such help afforded as the convention officers can supply.

2. That the departments be more fully sustained and efforts be made by all parish officers to secure the efficient working of the Normal class the Temperance and Primary Departments in their respective parishes.

3. That this Convention is now fully alive to the needs of this County in relation to the appointing and sustaining a local worker for part of the year for the purpose of striving to deepen the interest, in the organized schools, revive others, and open schools in some much neglected districts.

4. That this convention, appreciating the excellent and earnest work of the Rev. D. Fiske would hereby record its sense of obligation to Bro. Fiske, not only for his work in the Normal Department but also for the attention he has given to parish conventions.

5. That this convention cannot close without recording its unqualified appreciation of the invaluable services rendered to the County, the whole province and Sunday School work in general, by the retiring Field Secretary and assure Bro. Lucas he will live in the memory and affection and have the prayers of Sunday School workers and earnest Christian people in this County when his labors as Field Secretary of the Provincial Association shall have closed.

6 That the thanks of this convention be hereby tendered to the Pastor, the trustees and congregation of this church for the use of the same and to all who have so kindly and generously ministered to the needs of

those in attendance.

Great Power at Grand Falls.

With the St. John River at an unusually high freshet pitch, it is worth going quite a pilgrimage to see.

The St. John river has its rise about 200 miles above Grand Falls, and with its large tributaries, constitutes a mighty drainage system, as compared with the Androscoggin, Kennebec and Penobscot.

At Van Buren where the river is more than 1200 feet wide, it had a rise Saturday of about 22 feet, and that with a six-mile current. Imagine that volume of water plunging over Grand Falls, whose pitch is 76 feet, and continuous falls and rapids give 119 feet fall from the surface of the river above to the eddy at the foot of the gorge or canyon below.

The falls are more interesting from their formation than Niagara, although the descent is much less. The narrowing below of the gorge and the sharp turns, forcing the water to boil and surge, in working its way through, make it a very interesting scene. Grand is no misnomer for the falls.

Then to watch the logs which are running so thick in the river these days. Running when you go to bed, running when you awake in the morning, running ceaselessly. Where can so many logs come from, you silently question yourself.

Logs plunging over the falls, going into the seething mass to shoot out perhaps their full length, straight up in the air, popping out their heads anywhere like a school of flying fish.

A mighty waterpower is here, properly harnessed, at least a minimum of a 100,000 horse power running to waste. If it was in Uncle Sam's dominion, it would soon be utilized. I hope this article may lead some of its readers to go to Grand Falls whenever they are anywhere in its immediate vicinity. Whoever visits the place will feel well repaid for all time and expense.—C. A. Milliken in Kennebec Journal.
