COUNTY COUNCIL.

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE THREE.)

And the patient will get just as good treatment as if he paid for it. The hospital is conducted on business principles. As for the doctors he claimed that they were in a class by themselves. They do work that cannot be excelled by practitioners in large cities. When a patient can he pays from \$8.00 to \$10.00 a week. It has been considered advisable to include medical attendance in that bill. The cost of running the hospital the first 9 1/2 months was \$2800. It is thought it can be run this year for about \$3000. Ten of the free patients treated since June came from the county showing the county gets the benefit. Last year the average daily attendance was 4.5, the year 6.3. The board would like the council to make a permanent grant say for five years, and to be as generous as possible.

Mayor Belyas spoke of the benefit the county derived from the hospital. He showed the interest in it in town when little children would get up entertainments and bring the proceeds and present them to the hospital fund.

Coun. Carvell moved that the council devote \$500.00 a year for the two years of their tenure of office. He would go that far, although by a special direction each year they had the pleasure of listening to representatives of the board each year.

Coun. McDonald would favor a grant of \$500 a year for the remainder of the term of the lease of the present building. He moved an amendment to that effect, seconded by Mr. Carvell.

Coun. Williams favored the original motion. Coun. Gallagher thought the present council would have no right to bind future councils. He agreed with Coun. Carvell.

Coun. Bailey thought the council might perhaps be more generous. Westmoreland county gave to its hospital \$1000 for a building and \$500 annually for maintenance.

Coun. Smith suggested \$1200 for the two years.

Coun. Bradley thought we must not be too ready to give away money. There were taxpayers in the county who had lost all their crops for two years. They must be regarded.

The amendment was put and lost and the original motion carried.

Mr. Ireland thanked the councillors for their liberality. The deputation then withdrew.

The council went into committee of the whole on the bills and accounts, Coun. Bailey in the chair.

Council adjourned until ten o'clock tomorrow.

January 13th.

Council met at 10 A. M.
Coun. Bailey on behalf of the committee on Mr. Colpitts' accounts reported that they had examined the accounts and checked the vouchers and found the same correct and recommended that they be received. Carried.
Coun. Bailey also for the committee reported on a bill of the Police Magistrate for \$140 found it correct and he moved that it be paid. Carried.

On motion of Coun. Gallagher \$10.20 was ordered to be paid to Morgan Speer and charged to Kent Parish.

Inspector Colpitts, on motion, was heard. He said that it had been reported that there was an arrangement between him and Holman McMullin that the latter could keep on selling if he paid the Inspector \$50 now and then. He (Mr. Colpitts) had no way of disproving it, but had said that if they would get McMullin on this side of the line he would show that this was not so. They did succeed in getting him and the result would be sure to convince anybody that the story was wholly untrue.

Coun. Carvell moved that Inspector Colpitts' salary be \$300. for the coming year. Coun. Lamont seconded the motion.

Coun. Bradley moved in amendment that his salary be \$300. and that he get 10% on all the money he collects. Seconded by Coun. Giberson of Kent.

Coun. Gallagher moved as an amendment to the amendment, seconded by Coun. Connolly that the Inspector's salary be \$400. for the year.

Coun. Bailey—I voted for the \$300. salary. Mr. Colpitts got \$400. when the town and county were together. He did good work last year, and I would go for voting for an increase if he makes as good a showing next year, but not at present.

Coun. Connolly—I do not believe in trying to enforce the Scott act on the principle of making money, but on the principle of trying to rid the country of the evil of intoxicating liquor. I do not think there is necessarily any better showing because Mr. Colpitts has a surplus, than if he had a deficit. It would not do for him to go only for the sellers who have money to pay fines and let alone those whose only stock would be a few bottles of liquor.

Coun. Bradley—I think Mr. Colpitts will act only in the interest of the Act and that he is entitled to the 10 per cent commission which I have moved he should get. This is not a matter of dollars and cents, it is a matter of trying to stamp out the sale of intoxicating liquors.

Coun. Tompkins believed in giving the Inspector something worth his while.

Coun. Bailey denied that he believed in running the Act to make money. He was against laying information and proving 4 or 5 cases and settling for two. He was opposed to Coun. Bradley's motion. We must remember that the Inspector has had to spend some \$1500.

Coun. Carvell—The Inspector probably gets \$100. more than his salary by reason of the papers he serves. If the 10 per cent motion carried, according to last year's report he would have a salary of about \$590.

Coun. Bradley—He has to take his chances.

Coun. McDonald—I am opposed to the Scott Act. It has been 25 years in force and has accomplished nothing. I always contended that a license system would be the proper thing. I believe the county should go to work and get the Act repealed. As far as Mr. Colpitts is concerned, I believe he is as good a man as we can get, and I will vote to give him \$400.

Coun. Shaw—I am in favor of an increase. My experience is if I pay a man well, he will do all the better work for me.

Coun. Gallagher—Under the union of the town and county, Mr. Colpitt got \$300. from the county and \$100. from the town. Since that time he does not get the salary from the town. I believe in increasing his salary, and \$300. is not enough.

Inspector Colpitts was heard. He would like very much if the council could see their way to give him an increase. The extra hundred he got from serving certain papers, about paid for the keep of his horse which was an absolute necessity for the carrying on of the work. In reply to an inquiry about a man named Carr he was put in gaol, having once been let off on a promise which he did not keep that he would sell no more. On the doctor's advice, he was again released from gaol, again giving a solemn promise that he would quit the business.

The amendment to the amendment (for the \$400, being put was carried, all the councillors voting yes except the following who voted nay. Coun. Bradley had previously withdrawn his amendment. Nays—Fewer, Bailey, Bell, Lamont, Brown, Wiley, Williams, Carvell.

Coun. Connolly moved that the following sums be paid to the persons named for services, etc., and charged to Brighton parish: Charles Hurst, parish clerk, \$5.00; Richard Clark, \$4.40; Nehemiah Atkinson, road commissioner, \$4.11; Smith Page \$6.00; E. A. Britton, Commissioner, \$6.00; E. A. Britton,

\$6.29; Weden Fowler, \$3.99.

On motion of Coun. Lamont council ordered paid \$10.00 to D. McLeod Vince for searching records and charged to Aberdeen. He moved that Wm. Love be paid \$8.00 for use of hall on election and Ransford Gray, \$2.00 parish clerk and charged to Aberdeen.

On motion of Coun. Tompkins \$2.00 was ordered paid to George Jones and charged to Peel. \$4.00 was ordered paid to Hamilton Giberson for use of room and services election day.

Parish of Brighton was ordered to be assessed \$900.00 for poor purposes.

\$700.00 was ordered assessed to Richmond for the same purpose.

On motion of Coun. Tompkins, the assessors of Peel are to receive the same percentage as last year (3 1/2) and collector 5%.

On motion of Coun. Gallagher the assessors of Kent are to receive the same as last year, and the collectors 5 per cent on what is collected. Aberdeen was ordered \$350.00 for poor purposes.

On motion of Coun. Wiley the overseers of the poor for Aberdeen were ordered paid \$5.00 each for services for the coming year. On motion the revisors of Peel were ordered paid the same as last year.

On motion of Coun. Gallagher, \$128.00 was ordered assessed on Kent for road damages and paid to persons mentioned in resolution, also that \$217.00 be assessed on same parish for a similar purpose and paid to parties mentioned.

On motion Richmond and Aberdeen collectors were ordered to be paid same percentage as last year.

Wicklow was assessed \$200 for poor purposes and Simonds \$26.00.

\$8.00 was ordered paid parish clerk of Richmond.

Ordered revisors of Aberdeen be paid same as last year.

Richmond assessors were ordered paid 2 per cent.

Kent was ordered assessed \$300.00 for poor.

On motion assessors and collectors of Wicklow receive same percentage as last year.

Each overseer of poor for Richmond was ordered paid \$5.00. \$750.00 was ordered assessed on Wakefield for support of poor. \$150.00 on Northampton for same purpose, and \$600 on parish of Woodstock. The Wakefield assessment for poor, to be paid as follows, \$400 to F. J. Shaw, \$150 to Thomas Johnson and \$200 to E. E. Bell.
