And the patient will get just as good treat-When a patient can he pays from \$8 00 to \$10 00 a week. It has been considered advisable to include medical attendance in that bill. The cost of running the hospital the first 91 months was \$2800. It is thought it can be run this year for about \$3000. Ten of the free patients treated since June came from the county showing the county gets the benefit. Last year the average daily attendance was 4.5, the year 6 3.
