In a Quandary.

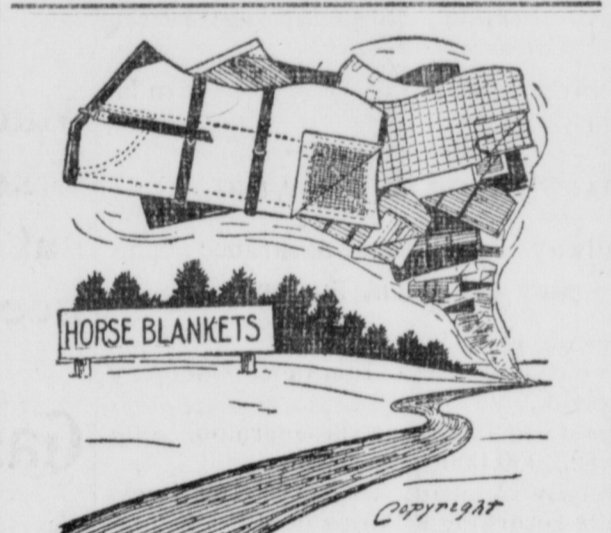
