OPERATED WITH POCKET KNIFE.

Physician in a Brooklyn Hospital Performs
Tracheotomy in Novel Way.

(From the New York Sun.)

Dr. E. I. Huppert, house physician at St.
John's hospital, Brooklyn, performed the
operation of tracheotomy with his pocket
knife as a lancet yesterday while his patient
was sitting at table.

Dr. Huppert was in one of the wards when
word was brought to him that he was needed
at once in the dining room. He hurried to
the room and found James Fay, one of the
attendants, choking to death, an oyster hav-
ing slipped into the wind-pipe. Dr. Huppert
took out his pocket knife and pushed the
blade into the man's throat. Then the doctor
slipped his finger into the wound and drew
out the oyster.

His prompt action saved the man's life.
To perform the operation of tracheotomy
usually the most delicate instruments are
used and each one is properly boiled and
disinfected. Dr. Huppert didn't have time
to wait for such niceties, and Fay, although
very weak and in bed last night, was glad
that the doctor didn't stop to wonder wheth-
er the ethics of the profession had been care-
fully satisfied.

Depew's Subtle Argument.

One of the first cases which Chauncey
Depew had after being admitted to the bar
was a civil suit involving a somewhat com-
plicated question of inheritance.

In no way daunted, young Chauncey
tackled it, looked up authorities all the way
