Japanese Woman in War.

Marchioness Oyama, wife of the victor of Mukden, describes in Collier's Weekly how the woman of Japan work for the soldiers in the field. In her plain, straightforward way she says:—"Since the outbreak of war I have hardly had time even to look after my household, so occupied has been my time in connection with many societies and organizations directly concerned with this war. Of course the foremost among them is the Red Cross Society. In connection with this is the Ladies' Volunteer Nursing Association, of which I am a director. The object of the society is impelled in its name, but aside from that we make bandages and the 'first aids' after the most approved methods. We have made tens of thousands of rolled bandages, and fifteen thousand of the first aids, and are still making them. The society includes the ladies of our highest class downward—the Imperial Princesses, the women of our nobility, etc. You cannot realize how earnest the ladies of our upper classes are unless you know their life intimately. They who never dressed themselves without maids waiting on them, they who never held in their hands anything heavier than their handkerchiefs, they who never went outside of their houses without two or three attendants, all come alone to the hospital with their little lunch baskets and their bundles containing their nurse's uniforms. My daughters were on the committee to put up New Year's presents for the soldiers at the front. Of course, it was impossible to send them to all, but it was better that even a few should have their hearts gladdened than none at all when they were doing so much for their country. The young people's plan was quite a novel one. They made bags of strong mulberry paper; about six inches wide and twelve inches long, in which they asked people to put in anything they liked—anything they thought soldiers would like. For instance, in one bag I put a pair of woollen socks, a piece of Japanese towel, a cake of soap, a toothbrush and tooth powder; in another a pair of warm gloves, a package of cigarettes, and a handkerchief; in another a package of silk wadding, postal cards, pencil, etc. When my daughter has time she sews on the little dresses for the children of the destitute families of soldiers. All the girls' schools offered to make soldiers' underclothing during the hours of their sewing lesson, which is always a part of the regular curriculum for girls' schools. The offer was accepted by the War Department, and even the youngest ones have been made happy, thinking they were doing something for the country."

IMMIGRATION BUSINESS.

St. John Shows an Increase This Year.

Figures of the immigration business at St. John and Halifax during the winter just closed show a large increase over the previous winter. These figures show there was landed at St. John during the two winters the following immigrants:

This makes a grand total for the past winter

of 36,270 and for the previous winter of 30,932. It is noticeable that while the immigration through St. John increased by 4,075 that through Halifax is only 1,233 better than in the winter of 1904. In that season 7,292 more immigrants landed at Halifax than at St. John, but this year Halifax beats St. John by only 4,320. St. John is coming rapidly to the front as the winter immigration port as well as the winter trade port, and in another year, with greater increase in the C. P. R. travel and with the coming of more of the Donaldson Line passenger boats, this port will probably catch up to and pass Halifax in the volume of the immigration business. About 10 per cent. of the immigrants who came to St. John this winter went to the United States. In previous years the percentage of American immigration was much greater.

The Menace of Money.

New York, May 8—Mr. Andrew Carnegie's \$10,000,000 benefaction to the college professors of the United States and Canada aroused great interest among Wall street men, who were disposed to do some calculating regarding the extent of the fortunes of the great capitalists of the country. One of them well qualified to make such a calculation is Henry Clews, for he has had business and social relations for forty years that puts him in a position to judge pretty well what the great fortunes really amount to.

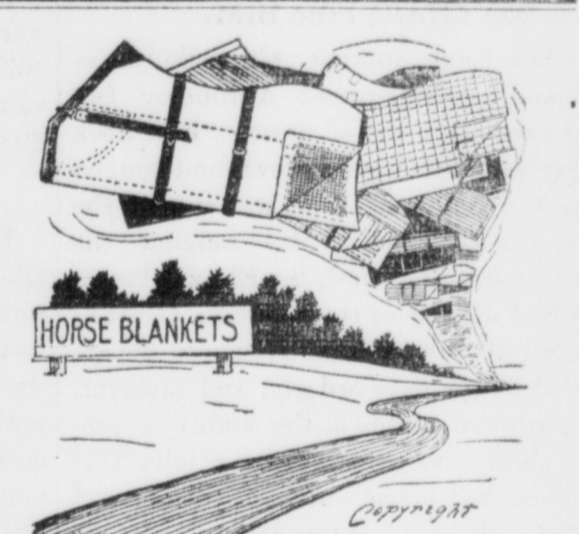
