Japanese Woman in War.

Marchioness Oyama, wife of the victor of Mukden, describes in Collier's Weekly how the field. In her plain, straightforward way she says :-- "Since the outbreak of war I have hardly had time even to look after my household, so occupied has been my time in connection with many societies and organizations directly concerned with this war. It is noticeable that while the immigration through St. John increased by the woman of Japan work for the soldiers in 4,075 that through Halifax is only 1,233 better than in the winter of I903 4 In that season 7,292 more immigrants landed at Halifax than at St. John, but this year Halifax beats St. John by only 4,320. St. John is coming rapidly to the front as the winter immigration port as well as the winter trade port, and in another year, with greater in-Society. In connection with this is the crease in the C. P. R. travel and with the coming of more of the Donaldson Line passenger boats, this port will probably catch up to and pass Halifax in the volume of the immigration business. About 10 per cent. of the immigrants who came to St. John this winter went to the United States. In previous years the percentage of American immigration was much greater.


The farmer's wife gave them a bountiful supply of bread and milk, and refused to take any pay for it.
