Gleaned From The Agricultural Report.

The New Brunswick Report on Agriculture shows that for the year 1904 the yield of wheat per acre for Carleton County was 21.2 bus., for Victoria County it was 19.7. The average for the whole province was 17.6 bus. and Carleton had the largest yield of any County. In the case of oats the yield in Carleton was 31.2 bus. per acre which was the largest except that in Charlotte, where the yield was 32 bus. The average for the province was 28.9 bus.

Carleton grew 26.1 bus. of barley per acre and was only beaten by Charlotte where the crop was just one bushel more per acre. The average for the province was 22.7 bus. per acre.

In the matter of buckwheat we raised 21.7 bus. per acre, while Victoria raised 22.8 and Charlotte 22.9. The average for the province was 20.4 bus.

When it comes to potatoes we put it over all the other counties, for our yield was 173.5 bus. while the next best county was Westmorland with 167.6. The average for the province was only 152.6.

In the matter of cheese King's County manufactured more than all the rest of the province together for she made 986,815 lbs., Westmorland came second with 238,899 lbs. York third, Victoria fourth, Madawaska fifth, Queens sixth and Carleton seventh.

This is a sad showing for our cheese industry. Four years ago we made nearly three times as much cheese as we made last year and we were easily the second county in the province in this industry.

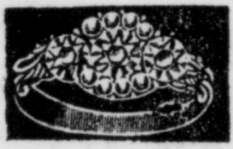
