## Another Bank Merger.

The People's Bank of Halifax will go out of existence in a few weeks, negotiations having been completed for its absorption by the Bank of Montreal. The paid up capital by the People's Bank is \$1,000,000, the reserve fund amounting to \$440,000. The par value of the shares is \$20. The People's Bank has twenty-seven branches, nine in Nova Scotia, eight in New Brunswick and ten in Quebec. It is said the Bank of Montreal is to give four thousand shares of its stock at a rate of 253 per cent, or \$1,012,000 and \$138,000 in cash for the People's Bank stock, and an arrangement has been made whereby the Bank of Montreal shares can be realized on at 255 per cent. per share, and also that the People's Bank shareholders get a dividend of 2 per cent. up to the first of June next. The merger is to go into effect on June 1.
