Rural Delivery Leads To Good Roads.

"I believe that rural man delivery is going to be one of the strongest agents in bringing about better country roads," said John Williams, living near Ankeny.

"The heavy snows and the deep drifts of the past few weeks have demonstrated that. The rule is, you know, that the rural carrier must deliver mail as long as the roads are open and passable. As a result of that, the farmers turned out last week when the roads drifted full of snow and shovelled them out so that the mail wagons could get through.

"You can find many places along the country roads where drifts twelve feet high have been cut through. Through these cuts one can drive with snow twelve feet high on either side of him. In many places the main road has been abandoned and fields have been entered through open gates to avoid some of the deeper drifts on the main highway.

"I look for considerable work during the spring and summer along the roads to prevent them getting so muddy that traffic is impeded, more especially so that the rural mail carrier can get through. The farmer has become accustomed to receiving his mail and now he wants it every day and is going to do what he can to get it."

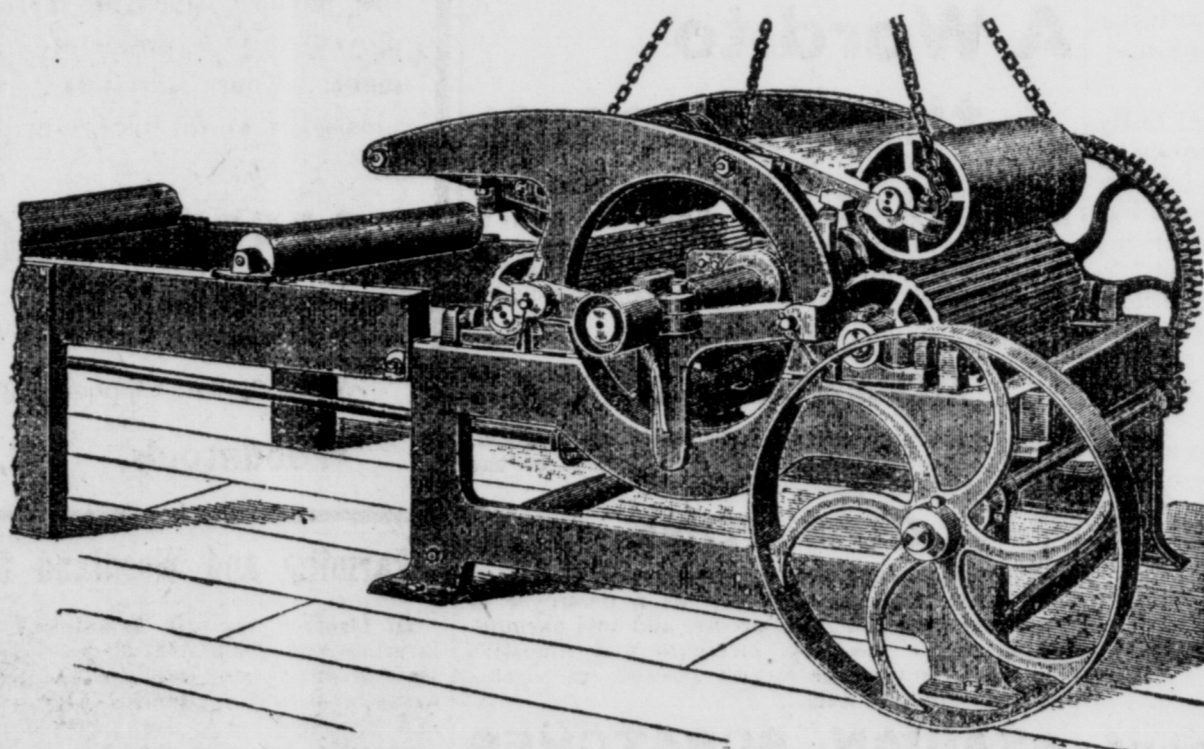

To Solve a Medical Mystery.

One of the most deadly of diseases as well as one of the most mysterious is cerebro-spinal meningitis, at present epidemic in New York and adjacent centres of population. It is of microbe origin, the particular micro-organism always present being known as the meningococcus. How this agency is transmitted and what is its mode of operation are still matters of speculation, and the New York Board of Health will by extensive research work seek to make the action of the meningococcus less a mystery. It is not yet certainly known whether the disease-producing organism are commonly present in the throat and nasal passages of persons in normal health or whether they are present only before an attack of cerebro-spinal meningitis. That the disease is infectious seems to be beyond dispute. Indeed, an outbreak that occurred a week ago in Russell county, in the Ottawa valley, plainly indicates this. One after the other three men and a girl belonging to a family took ill and died of a mysterious disease that the local physicians could not diagnose. It was not until Dr. Hodgetts, Secretary of the Provincial Health Board, went down that the cause of death was understood.

That New York has reason for grave alarm and for the inquiry about to be undertaken is apparent from the statistics of death from cerebro-spinal meningitis. In 1903 there were 107 deaths from this cause in New York. In 1904 the number had increased to 1,211. Last month there were 149 deaths, or at the rate of 1,888 per year; last week there were 131, or at the rate of 6,812 per year, divided as follows: Cerebro-spinal meningitis 49, simple meningitis 65, tubercular meningitis 17. Nearly half of this mortality is in children under five years of age, and a large percentage of the other half is of young persons of both sexes under fifteen.
