SULLIVAN BROS., the enterprising Main street grocers, expect to have their ice cream parlor running about the 1st of May. They have already put in place an elegant onyx soda fountain, the only one of the kind ever imported into Canada. In connection with the fountain is a machine which will manufacture all the soda they will use. They have also purchased a Mendelssohn piano which will play 150 different tunes. The instrument will have a direct motor attachment and get its power from a storage battery. The front part of the store will contain the soda fountain and attachments, while the rear will be converted into an attractive ice cream parlour. The two apartments will be separated by a railing with a gateway in the centre. On the posts of this gateway will be two coloured globes lighted by electricity. Along the rail will be placed beautiful artificial ferns standing eight feet high. Fancy fans and palms will add to the decoration of the rail and parlour, giving the whole the appearance of an oriental garden. The outside of the establishment will be tastefully painted in harmonious colours and a red awning will be suspended along the whole front. When completed this cafe will be the equal of any in the Maritime Provinces.
