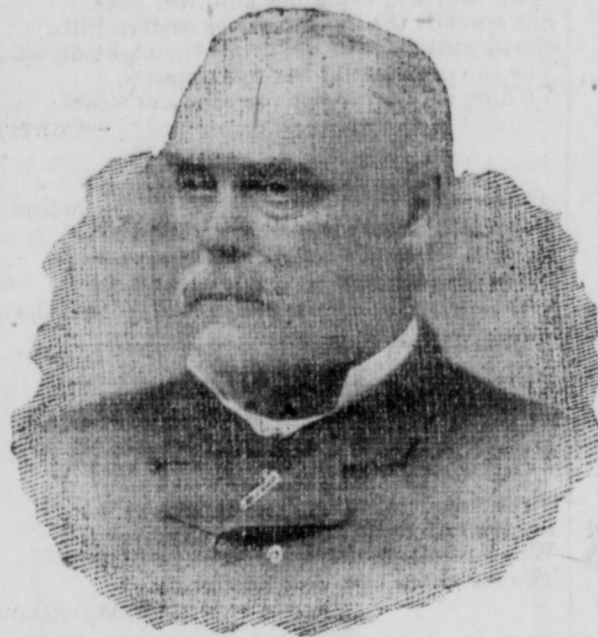

OBITUARY.

Gilbert William Vanwart.

Gilbert William Vanwart died at his late residence on Thursday evening, surrounded by the members of his family. For the past year his health had been failing, although he was able to go to his place of business until a short time ago. Mr. Vanwart belonged to a well known and highly respected family, and had a reputation for keen business ability and integrity. For the past 30 years he had been identified with the business interests of the town of Woodstock, and in school matters he took an especial interest. He was 73 years of age.



He was born in Hampstead, Queens County, N. B., October 29th, 1832, a son of Isaac VanWart whose paternal ancestors emigrated from Holland to New York in Colonial times. In 1783 his grandfather, Isaac VanWart, senior, came from his birthplace, Long Island, N. Y., with a colony of Loyalists, to New Brunswick, and settled at Wickham, Queens County.

Gilbert W. VanWart acquired his early education in the common schools of Hampstead, and during his younger days became thoroughly acquainted with the practical details of farming. In 1857 he embarked in mercantile business forming a partnership with William Stephenson as head of the firm of VanWart and Stephenson which for five years had a large trade in general merchandise. In 1862 he bought out the interest of the junior partner and continued the business alone until the time of his death. In the earlier part of his career he carried on an extensive wholesale trade, furnishing goods to the greater number of the dealers on the upper part of the St. John river. For several years Mr. VanWart, in addition to his other business was agent of three express companies, and also did private banking, there being at that time no organized bank in Woodstock. He also acted as agent for the St. Stephen Bank of St. Stephen. In 1880 he assumed the agency of the Maritime Bank of the Dominion of Canada and continued its agency until the bank went out of existence.

Mr. VanWart married Phoebe, daughter of Roberson Merritt, of Hampstead, N. B. Of the five children that blessed their union three are now living, namely, Gertrude Ella, wife of J. Norman W. Winslow, Esq., of Woodstock; Aurilla, wife of Jarvis S. Stinson, of Boston, Mass; and Annie Mabel, who married George H. Harrison, Principal of the Carleton County Grammar School.

Mr. VanWart served four terms in the Town Council and was one of the School Trustees from the adoption of the free school system. He belonged to Woodstock Lodge, Free and Accepted Masons, and was a member of the Free Baptist church.

The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon from his late residence. Rev. F. Allison Currier officiated at the house. A male quartette composed of Dr. Baker, Clyde B. Watson, A. B. Burden and Lester Hull, sang three selections, "Nearer to Thee," "We are going down the Valley," "Some Blessed Day." The casket, covered with beautiful flowers, was carried from the house by the pallbearers, Messrs. H. A. Connell, A. Wilmot Hay, D. C. Grant and Col. D. M. Vince. The members of the Masonic Lodge marched in the funeral procession immediately after the mourners. They were followed by the members of the School Board.

The beautiful Masonic burial service was read at the grave by P. M. John McLauchlan.

Death of Mrs. R. D. Tompkins.

Mrs. R. D. Tompkins died at East Florenceville, on April 18th, in the 78th year of her age. Mrs. Tompkins was much respected in the community. She leaves four sons and two daughters. The funeral services were held in the Methodist church on the 21st inst., and were conducted by Rev. A. H. Hayward, assisted by Rev. W. L. Steeves, of Salisbury. Her remains were interred in the Free Baptist cemetery beside those of her husband.

N. B. Teachers' Association.

The third annual convention of the New Brunswick Teachers' Association met in the High School, Fredericton, April 24th. President W. M. McLean was in the chair, and the delegates present were: W. M. McLean, J. S. Myles, J. Frank Owens and Thomas E. Powers of St. John; Chas. D. Richards, Woodstock; R. Estabrooks McAdam; Miss Bessie M. Fraser, Grand Falls; H. B. Burton Loggie, Chatham; H. H. Stuart, Harcourt; Frank A. Good, Fredericton; Fred A. Dixon, Sackville; W. R. Shanklin of Sunbury and Queen; and S. W. Irons of Moncton.

The secretaries report was cheering and showed the association in a prosperous condition. All the delegates gave encouraging reports.

The schedule of salaries as revised in March was adopted unanimously. The recommendations of the Chief Superintendent in regard to the increase of salaries and the establishment of Parish School Boards were heartily endorsed and a legislative committee appointed to bring this and other matters to the attention of the government.

A motion looking forward to the establishment of a Teachers' Bureau was also passed and members of the Association leaving their schools are urged to communicate with their County Secretaries who will furnish this information free to members of the association who may apply for it. Many other matters of interest to the profession were discussed.

MANUAL TRAINING BRANCH.
The Director of Manual Training begs to announce that, should a sufficient number of teachers apply, a vacation course will be held in the Provincial Normal School at Fredericton, or in some convenient centre, from July 5th to 29th, inclusive.

Particular attention will be given to the various forms of Handwork suitable for small schools and for the lower grades of town schools, as suggested in the Departmental Circular issued last autumn. Courses in paper-folding and cutting; colour work; parquetry and designing in coloured papers; constructive work in paper and cardboard; benchwork in wood and Venetian iron-work will be offered.

A good opportunity will be thus afforded teachers who may be desirous of becoming acquainted with the latest developments of Manual Training; also to those who contemplate taking the courses for specialists in Manual Training later on.

How to Prepare an Egg Tonic.

A raw egg is an excellent tonic and is very strengthening. If prepared in the following way it is really a delicious drink. Put the yolk of an egg into a dish with a teaspoonful of white sugar and a teaspoonful of orange or lemon juice and beat lightly together with a fork. Put the white on a plate and add a pinch of salt; then, with a broad bladed knife, beat it to a stiff froth. Now, as lightly as possible, mix all together in the dish, then as lightly transfer it to a clean tumbler, which it will nearly fill if properly made. It must not stand in a warm place, as it soon becomes liquid and loses its snowy look. Any fruit juice may be used in place of orange or lemon.
