Ministerial Changes.

There will be a radical change made in the Dominion cabinet within a few months, and chiefly among the Ontario representatives. Hon. James Sutherland, will not return. Sir William Mullock will go to London as Lord Strathcona's successor, Sir Richard Cartwright and Hon. R. W. Scott will retire on an allowance. A bill will probably be brought in this session providing, it is said, a retiring allowance for aged privy councillors, tramed along the same lines as the law now exists in England. In Britain, a retuing privy councillor must apply for the pension or allowance so allotted, but when he does it is granted immediately. It is understood and acknowledged in high places that both Sir Richard and Hon. Mr. Scott are anxious to retire on these conditions.

There is no longer any doubt that since the departure of Hon. Mr. Sutherland, the cabinat as now constituted, have drifted away from the masses of the party. Among the prospective ministers mentioned are Chief Whip Calvert of Middlesex, Archie Campbell, Centre York, Wm. German of Welland, Robert Rogers of Peterboro, Gec. Grant of South Ontario, Hugh Guthrie of Guelph and others. It is no secret that an effort will be made, or is being made, to induce William Harty of Kingston to accept a postfolio when the changes take place.

The retirement of M. K. Cowan, ex M. P. for Essex, is considered a loss and a weakness to the party in Western Ontario .--United Canada (Ottawa).

The fact is, that in Japan everybody bathes in puris naturalibus. It is their way, and it is not till a European has lived among them for years that he or she realizes that, after all, there is nothing very terrible about it .-"Modern Society."

The War-Making Power.

Sir John Macdonell the master of the Supreme Court of Judicature in England prepared a valuable paper for the recent Manchester peace conference on the power of the Executive in leading countries of the world to declare war or enter upon hostilities without previously consulting Parliament.

The British jurist presents an instructive classification of countries on this threshold

Those under which the sovereign is free to declare war when he pleases.

Those under which he possesses such power, but is required to communicate the fact to the Parliament or Chambers as soon

Those under which he must obtain the approval or assent of Parliament or other constitutional body, or in which such power is vested in Congress or Parliament.

The chief countries coming under the first class are Austria, Japan, Denmark, Greece, Russia, and Great Britain. In the second class are Belgium, Holland, Italy, Portugal, about five o'clock, and, beginning at one and Spain. In the third class are France,

and Germany, can with safety submit to the restrictions which I have quoted, why should not England? If the United States . . . are content to invest Congress with this power, what need can there be for our Executive to possesss it subject to no restrictions?"

Breaking at Long-Fastened Seal.

The New York Outlook, in commenting on the arrival of the British expedition at Lhassa, points out that the significance of the unfurling of the British flag in the capital of Thibet is found in the dramatic evidence it furnishes of the opening up of Asia to Western trade and influence. For centuries Thibet has been a forbidden country. Scores of crafty and courageous men have perished in the endeavor to invade its privacy and discover what lay behind the closely guarded front which it presented to the world. It is thirteen hundred years since Lhassa was founded, but in that time, so far as records have been preserved, not more than twenty foreigners have been within its walls, and most of these were Hindus. Sev. eral Englishmen have been in Thibet, but only one had ever seen Lhassa before the arrival of the British troops, on August 3, and this Englishman was Thomas Manning, who entered in 1811, and, as a physician, performed some cures on Chinese troops and was allowed to accompany them to Lhassa, where he stayed several months. From that date until the present only two Europeans have been in Lhassa-French missionaries, who were able to reach the clty in disguise in 1884, and the story of whose adventures and privations is most fascinating and thrilling.





Banana Jelly.

Soak haif an ounce of gelatine in sufficient water to cover and let it stand over night. In the morning pour on it a pint of boiling water, add three ounces of sugar, the juice of two lemons and the rind of one grated. Let all stand for a quarter of an hour, strain through sloth and put in a few drops of red coloring, a drop at a time. Peel four ripe bananas and cut them in two in the middle; set up in jelly tumblers and pour in sufficient jelly to fill the glasses. Set to cool and before serving pile a little whipped cream on each glass.

Maple Fudge.

Into a smooth granite saucepan put three cups of maple sugar, one cup of rich milk and one rounded tablespoon of butter. Let the mixture boil over a quick fire, stirring constantly. When it begins to boil away from the edge drop a little in cold water, and if you can take it up in a firm ball it is done. Add one teaspoon of vanilla and stir until it ! is beginning to thicken then pour into buttered plates and when cool cut into squares. If you like you may stir in one or two cups of pecans slightly salted an broken into bits just as you remove it from the fire.
