The Grand Falls Companies.

The preliminary organization meeting of the Grand Falls Power Co., was held at the Royal Hotel St. John last week. This company recently secured a charter from the New Brunswick legislature, and their intention is to establish an immense power plant at Grand Falls. Already a deposit of 40,000 as a guarantee that they will proceed with the work is in the hands of the government. Those present at the meeting last evening were Charles Newell and F. C. Snyles of Providence R. I.; Harry McLaughlin and B. E. Kingman of New York.

Mr. McLaughlin informed the Sun that it was the intention of the company to commence operations the coming summer. Eventually, he said, it was probable that a pulp mill, a ferro manganese reduction plant and other industries would be established at Grand Falls. The company will also have power to sell to other parts of the province. Mr. McLaughlin said that all he knew of W. K. Vanerbilt's visit to Grand Falls he saw in the newspapers. The members of the company present at the meeting had an interview with Attorney General Pogsley last evening.

The other Grand Falls Power Co., the one incorporated on March 25th, under dominion charter, are lying low. Sir William Van Horne, who is president of this other company, states that he is not yet ready to finance the concern and it cannot be learned when this will be done. At any rate no work is to be begun in the near future and the intention of the company in securing incorporation last month was for the purpose of holding the rights secured by the first company, whose charter had been cancelled through lapse of time.
