A Cheeky Burglar.

On Sunday night a burglar entered the stores of G. W. VanWart, dry goods, and Fred B. Snider, dry goods and sundries, on King street.

He took nothing from Mr. VanWart's store, apparently, but from Mr. Snider's store he took a number of watches and a quantity of plated table ware to the value of about \$75.00.

A young lad in the employ of Mr. Snider entered his store about 4 o'clock on Sunday afternoon and everything was all right at that time.

The burglar apparently went to Mr. VanWart's store first. He tried the back doors but they were so securely fastened that he gave up at that point and tried a window. He pried off the wooden shutter, broke the corner out of an upper pane of glass, slipped the brace that held the lower sash down, raised the sash and entered. Not a thing in the store was touched. The burglar did not even find a till containing the sum of \$12.00. It looks as if he got into the wrong store and immediately set out to rectify his mistake. He went to Mr. Snider's store and pried open the outside door, broke a pane of glass in the inner doors and reaching in he found the key in the lock, unlocked it and entered. He had apparently been in the store before and located the things he wanted, for he cleaned up the show case containing the watches and table cutlery and did not touch anything else.

On Sunday evening about eight o'clock a very slight coat of snow fell and in this the burglar's tracks could be plainly seen. He was apparently a well grown man wearing stout boots but no overshoes nor rubbers.

Mr. Kelly and Mr. Woolverton have the matter in hand and hope to get the burglar.

Town Council.

At the meeting of the town council on Monday evening in the absence of the Mayor Councillor Henderson occupied the chair.

Police Magistrate and town marshal's reports were received and placed in the hands of the finance and audit committee.

Coun. Stevens who interviewed Mr. Scott in regard to auditing town treasurer's accounts, said the work could be done for \$25 or \$30.

Coun. Leighton read the new wood law as drafted by the town clerk. This law will give the inspector power to enforce measurement. The price will be 7 cents per load or cord where measured on the sled, and where piled 10 cents per cord for the first five cords, and five cents per cord over that amount. The price for scaling lumber is 10 cents per thousand feet, manufactured or rough. A fine not exceeding \$5.00 will be imposed on anyone breaking this bye law.

Report of T. C. L. Ketchum, auditor of D. Munro's accounts was received and filed.

In regard to purchasing twelve new street lamps at a cost of \$310.00, Coun. Fisher said he had made inquiries and found that the lamps could not be used if the town made a contract with any other power company to light the town. He thought the expenditure would be justified as it would probably be October before any change would be made and then the lamps could be sold for half what they cost.

Coun. McManus said there had been a good deal of complaint lately about the poor system of lighting our streets, and thought something should be done at once.

Coun. Nicholson wanted to know why the town was not lighted properly during the past winter.

Coun. Fisher said at the present time there was not enough wood to run the water department and the lights together, and the lights had to be turned off.

Matter will be taken up on Friday night.

Coun. Leighton seconded by Coun. McManus moved that tenders be asked from the three local concerns, Messrs Dunbar & Sons, Small & Fisher Co., and Connell Bros. for putting a new boiler in the fire engine. Carried.

Coun. Leighton said the town was now paying from \$125.00 to \$150.00 for heating the town building. He moved seconded by Coun. McManus that tenders be asked for putting in apparatus for heating by steam or hot water, carried.

Coun. Stevens said the school board had asked him for \$1000.00. There was due them on the 30th of June 1905 some \$1600.00. The board was now overpaid and he thought it was up to them and not the town to raise the money.

After some discussion the matter was laid over until Friday evening.

C. F. Rogers submitted a tender for supplying gravel to the town for \$3.00 per cord. His tender was accepted at 60 cents per yard, which is the same thing, only easier of measurement.

The question of putting asphalt sidewalk on Main Street was brought up by Coun. Nicholson. His view was that the town should put down and keep in order the sidewalks of the town.

Coun. Leighton moved that the chairman of the road committee make an estimate of the cost of curbing and putting down sidewalk on Main Street and report at meeting on Friday evening. Carried.

The Agricultural Society and the summer carnival committee asked the council to grant \$200.00 to each.

Coun. Leighton seconded by Coun. Nicholson, moved that the assessors be requested to attend at the Council meeting on Friday evening. Carried.

Council adjourned.

Presentation to Mr. Donald Munro.

At a special meeting of Hose Co. No. 1 on Monday night a handsome pair of brass pipes in a case was presented to Mr. Donald Munro the retiring superintendent of water works. Chief Tattersall who presided made the presentation. Mr. Munro who responded in feeling terms said that one of his reasons for resigning was that the capacity of the pumping plant was insufficient, for a large period of the year, to supply enough water to control a bad fire. He had urged this on the town council from year to year, and while every other part and detail of the town's system for extinguishing a fire had been put in excellent condition the capacity of the pumps had not been increased.

Addresses were made by all the firemen and by H. Paxton Baird, John McKenzie, B. M. MacLeod and Dr. Sprague, all of whom spoke in highest praise of the work Mr. Munro had done in the Woodstock fire department for the last 33 years.
