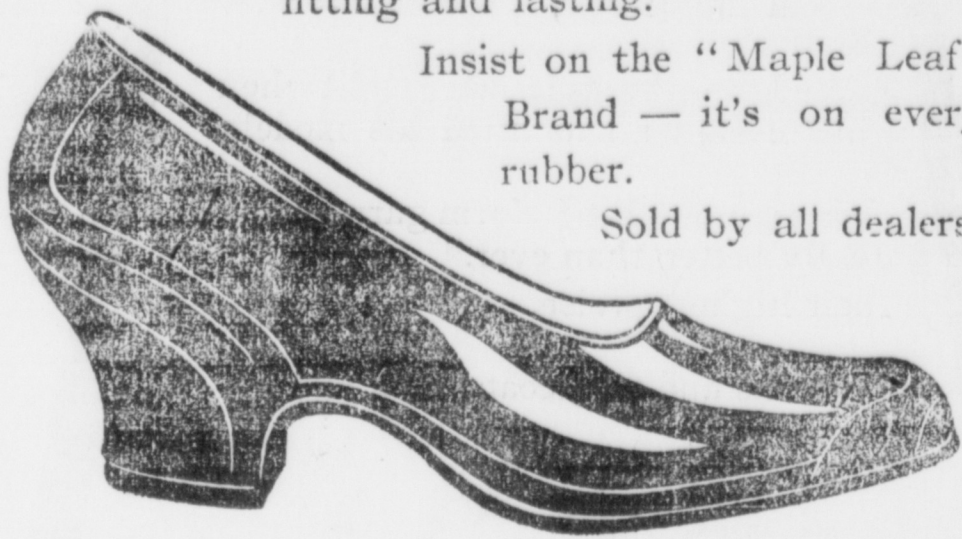

The Galt Reporter complains because \$22,231,000 worth of iron and steel goods were, it says, imported into Canada in the last fiscal year. But what would the Reporter have? In the year named a bounty of \$2.25 per ton was paid out of the Dominion treasury on all the pig iron made in Canada from Canadian ore; the same bounty was paid on steel ingots made from this iron, and a bounty of \$4.50 per ton on rolled wire rods. In addition to this there was imposed a Customs tax of \$7 per ton on imported bar iron or steel, \$8 per ton on cast iron pipe, and 35 per cent, on wrought iron or steel tubing. Will the Reporter kindly tell us how much more we should do to encourage home manufacturers and discourage imports?

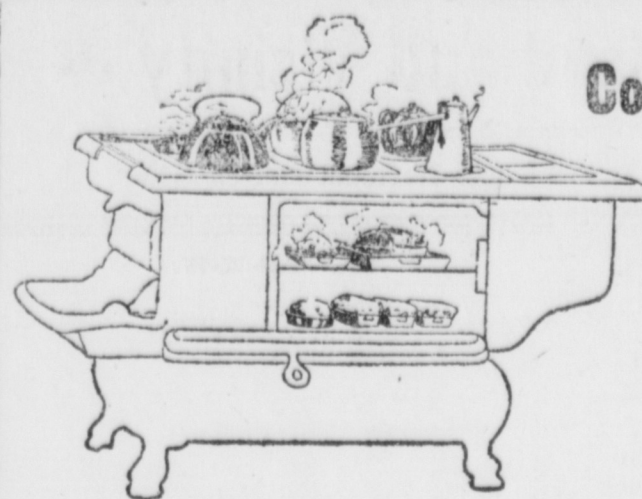

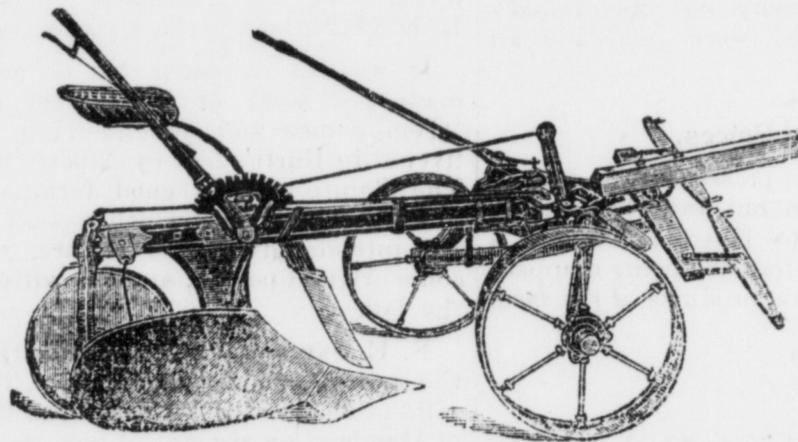
