

The Galt Reporter complains because \$22, 231,000 worth of iron and steel goods were, it says, imported into Canada in the last fiscal year. But what would the Reporter have? In the year named a bounty of \$2.25 per ton was paid out of the Dominion trea-sary on all the pig iron made in Canada from Canadian ore; the same bounty was paid on steel ingots made from this iron, and a bounty of \$4.50 per ton on rolled wire rods. In addition to this there was imposed a Customs tax of \$7 per ton on imported bar iron or steel, \$8 per ton on cast iron pipe, and 35 per cent, on wrought iron or steel tabing. 
