### Mr. Fisher's Gifts to the Community.

The people of the town of Woodstock and the County of Carleton have every reason to be grateful to the late Lewis P. Fisher, who has left them practically his entire wealth to be used for educational, charitable and other public purposes. At a moderate estimate he has left over \$400,000 to be used for the moral, social, intellectual and physical well being of the community in which he spent the greater part of a long life.

This is a large fortune to be accumulated in this community, where fortunes are not large. In order to understand the magnificence of Mr. Fisher's bequests to us it may be said that they amount to over 20 per cent. of the assessed value of all the property in the town of Woodstock. As a result of his munificence we are to have a magnificent public school building, a hospital building such as no town of this size in Canada often dreams of, a public library, a public park, our manual training school strengthened, and perhaps a school of arts and sciences including a department of agriculture.

In his wish that the people might reap the fullest advantages from his bequests, he looked beyond present conditions, and considered the changes that the progress of time might bring. To the trustees of the estate, Mr. A. B. Connell K. C. and Col. F. H. J. Dibblee, he gave very large discretionary powers in the management of the funds for the public good.

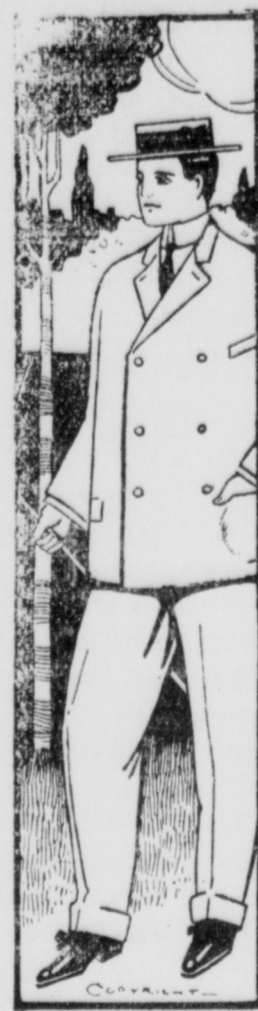
