

Value of Skim Milk.

The New York Produce Review, in discussing the value of skim milk for feeding purposes, says it is a fundamental fact that all feed, including milk, is worth considerably more the younger the animals are. This fact was clearly demonstrated by an experiment conducted by Professor Henry's of Wisconsin, in which pigs averaging 38 lbs. in weight only required 293 lbs. of feed for 100 lbs. of gain, and those averaging 78 lbs. required 400 lbs., while those weighing 320 lbs. required 535 lbs. of food for 100 lbs. of gain in weight. The value of milk again depends on the intelligence shown in its use. Thus if a bushel of corn is worth 28 cents then skim milk is worth 15 cents per 100 lbs., if not more than three pounds of milk is given with one pound of meal, but if nine pounds of milk is given to one pound of meal, the value is reduced to 9 cents. All intelligent farmers agree, says the Review, that the feeding value will average from 20 to 25 cents per 100 lbs., and to this should be added, at least, 5 cents (chemists claim, we believe, 7 cents) for its manurial value when fed on the farm. That it may be made of great value under certain conditions, is illustrated by the fact reported in Hoard's Dairyman of two poultry buying concerns in Springfield, Mo., buying skim milk at 40 cents for 10 gallons, paying 15 cents a can freight and providing the cans, making it cost them, with hauling from R. R. depot, about 75 cents per 100 lbs. This has been going on for two years, and if these firms can make it pay, why don't the farmers utilize it themselves instead of selling it for 10 or 15 cents for industrial purposes?

Diet and Indigestion.

Even very abstemious people are often sufferers from indigestion caused by over eating. The amount of food they take is not too much for the day, but it is distinctly too much for the time they take it. We will suppose the case of a woman who has had nothing since her light lunch, and who has come home tired and hungry with her day's work to a dinner at seven o'clock. She was tired out; her stomach, like the rest of her body, was unfit for work, and the digestion of a meal means hard work for that organ. Instead of dining directly she came in, she should have taken a cup of hot water with a

teaspoonful of milk in it, and then sat down quietly for five minutes. Had she done this, and then begin to eat slowly, masticating thoroughly, all would have been well. The little pick-me-up would have enabled the stomach to do its work. If only people would more generally follow this plan, dyspepsia would be less frequent than it is at present.

To the Teachers of the Maritime Provinces.

The Nineteenth Annual Session of the School of Science for Atlantic Provinces will be held at Yarmouth, N. S., from July 11th to 28th, 1905. Among those who will take part in evening lectures and round table talks will be Principal Solon, Normal School, Truro, Dr. Hall, Truro, Dr. Mackay, Dalhousie College, several of the District Inspectors, with two or three special lectures not yet arranged for.

Bought Mill and Lumber Lands.

Mr. F. H. Hale, of Enderby, has purchased the property of the Cedar Valley Improvement Company from the Union Bank at Lethbridge, into whose hands it fell when the company became bankrupt a year ago. The sale was put through this week after Mr. Hale had had some negotiations with Mr. Vibert, of the bank at Lethbridge. Mr. Hale sent an experienced lumberman to cruise this property thoroughly for him a few weeks ago, and he went over it himself two weeks ago.

The deal includes the mill and plant and all the timber rights of the company.

Mr. Hale has instructed Chas. Tuttle, who has been caretaker of the property, to put the plant in working order, and it is understood the mill will be operated at an early date. One of the greatest difficulties in connection with this fine lumber property was transportation to the railway. Since the closing of the mill the G. N. R. track has been built and the new owner has made arrangements for a spur line to his yards.

UNIFORMS will be issued from the 10th day of June to the 23rd day of June, both dates inclusive. All horses must be examined by the Veterinary Officer before being taken.

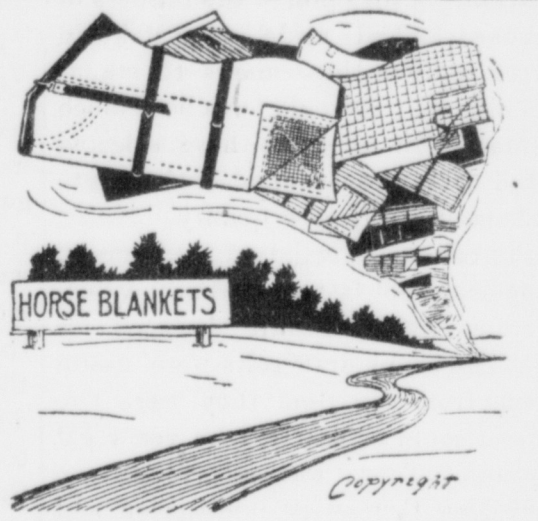
