### Edward Dunphy Found Dead.

While working on the farm of Thibideau Brothers at Richmond, on Friday morning last, William Travis came upon the body of a man hanging feet downward from a hole in the side of the barn. The body was removed and proved to be that of Edward Dunphy of Houlton, who originally, it is said, came from Calais, Me.

A wide board had been torn from the side of the barn leaving a triangular aperture. A small timber extended partly across this opening. Evidently Dunphy had tried to climb in the opening by the help of a beam above and had missed his grasp of the beam and fallen. He caught between the end of the small timber and the side of the opening. The body was tightly wedged when found.

Coroner Hay was quickly summoned and a jury was expanelled composed of the following: J. M. Merritt, James Gallagher, John Hamilton, Thomas Shields, Thomas McBride, James McBride and J. E. Radigan. A verdict of accidental death was returned. Chief of Police Gue of Houlton took charge of the body and it was conveyed to Houlton. Dunphy was about 65 years of age. He was well known in Woodstock where he was for some time employed by D. A. Grant as a carriage-maker.

### Meeting of Presbytery.

The Presbytery of St. John met in St. John's church, Mackenzie Corner on Thursday evening 20th inst., for the purpose of inducting Rev. J. F. Polley, B. A., late of Waterford, King's Co., into the pastoral charge of the congregation of Richmond. There were present Revs. J. H. A. Anderson, Moderator, W. J. Fowler, J. F. Polley, ministers, and Mr. Henry Hay, Elder. Revs. A. D. Archibald, of Rexton, Miramichi Presbytery and Rev. Kenneth McKay of Houlton, Me., Presbytery of Boston, both former pastors of this congregation, being present, were invited to sit and correspond. A large and representative congregation was present to welcome their new minister. After devotional services the moderator inducted Mr. Polley into the pastoral charge of the congregation. Rev'ds. Mr. Archibald and Mr. Fowler suitably addressed the newly-inducted minister and the people respectively.

Rev. Mr. Polley is a graduate in Arts from Dalhousie University and in Theology from the Presbyterian college Halifax. He comes to Richmond with ten years experience as a successful pastor, and he begins the pastorate in a congregation united, loyal and progressive.

At the same meeting of the Presbytery, a letter was read from Rev. E. A. Wicker, B. D., resigning the pastoral charge of St. Stephen's church, St. John, to accept an appointment to the chair of New Testament Exegesis and Literature in San Francisco Theological Seminary. The letter was received and the clerk instructed to cite the congregation of St. Stephen to appear for their interests at a meeting of Presbytery to be held in St. Andrews church St. John on Tuesday, Aug. 1st at 3 o'clock p. m.

### Clergyman Assaulted.

On Maryland Hill, Fredericton, Friday night Rev. F. Clarke Hartley, of Houlton, Me., Free Baptist church, late of Fredericton, was attacked by three roughs, knocked down and kicked in the most brutal manner, and left for dead on the side of the road. Rev. Mr. Hartley arrived with Mrs. Hartley about a week ago to spend a short time with Mrs. Hartley's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ludlow Yerxa, in the post office building. Friday afternoon was spent with a party of friends in a summer camp on Maryland Hill. He started to return home about 9.30 o'clock, and when near the residence of A. H. E. Randolph was accosted by three men, one of whom asked him for a match. While handing the man the match he was struck in the face by one and knocked down. The three brutes then kicked and abused him in the most violent manner. After some little time Mr. Hartley managed to regain his feet, and with much difficulty made his way to the home of Mr. Yerxa, on Queen street. Dr. Vanwart found him suffering from a broken rib and several bruises about the head and body. The police were promptly notified, but have little to work on. Rev. Mr. Hartley, who is a very popular clergyman, a son of the late Rev. Dr. Hartley of Carleton, will be confined to the house for some time. There is doubt whether the motive was robbery or whether the miscreants mistook Mr. Hartley for someone else.
