Sussex Military Camp.

What will probably prove to be the largest militia camp held in this province since the memorable days of the Marquis of Lorne and Princess Louise, opens in Sussex June 27th. In addition to the large number of men under canvas there last year there will be included this summer the Woodstock and Newcastle Field Batteries, the newly organized Army Service Corp and the Corp of Guides. The Infantry Brigade is composed of the 67th, 71st, 73rd and 74th Regiments under the command of Col. H. H. McLean. All these regiments take their bands to camp and the spirit of friendly rivalry which seems to prevail insures all lovers of good music a twelve days treat with a lasting impression. That our own 67th Band will be able to sustain its enviable reputation seems to be the general impression of those who have the good fortune to hear their excellent concerts in the town of late. In town both Major Good and Captain Bull have commenced recruiting and since the substantial increase of pay and better rations came into effect the difficulty of getting the right kind of men is considerably lessened. There is of course always a number of vacancies to be filled owing to removals and sickness, etc., and those intending to avail themselves of the opportunity of going to the big camp had better apply immediately. The 67th Regiment Band will be armed for the first time, this summer, with the new Lee Enfield rifle and Oliver equipment. With this equipment all belts and straps are of brown leather thereby reducing the amount of labor in keeping them clean. It is also the intention of the officers to provide the men with straw hats for hot days, adding materially to the comfort of the men. The different company officers commence the issuing of uniforms about the 10th of June. The whole camp will be under the command of Col. Geo. Rolt, White, D. O. C., assisted by a carefully selected staff of officers among whom will be found Col. D. McLeod Vince of this town who will hold a very responsible position as usual.

LOST HIS HORSE.

Clergyman's Steed Kicked By Another and Had to be Shot.

Rev. J. H. Coy last Thursday started from St. Stephen with his horse and carriage to drive to St. John by way of St. George and Pennfield, on his way to Beulah camp. He drove to Seely's Cove in the lower part of Pennfield, a distance of forty miles, and put up at the house of Mr. Harding, a fisherman and farmer. In the morning he found that Mr. Harding's horses had broken loose and kicked his animal, breaking its leg and cutting a blood vessel.

Rev. Mr. Coy had a man shoot the injured horse and he also had his wagon taken to Pennfield station and thence came to St. John.

Rev. Mr. Coy says the mare was a very fine driver, lately purchased from Roy Young of Milltown (N. B.), and was formerly owned by Irving Todd, of St. Stephen. The loss is a heavy one.

More Wool Smugglers Now Under Arrest.

The United States government officers are engaged in another crusade against smugglers on the New Brunswick border. A dozen arrests have been made since the middle of May. Among the number was Jack Wise of Houlton, who is now at liberty on \$1,000 bonds for his appearance at the June term of the United States district court in Portland on a charge of smuggling liquor. Wise is alleged to be the proprietor of one of the so-called boundary stores, who has eluded the customs officers for some time. The latest capture was made yesterday, when three alleged wool smugglers were taken. Nicholas Habeeb, Thomas Mory and Alexander Antone of Caribou were held for the June term of the U. S. district court. The respondents are Syrian peddlers. All were committed to jail in default of bail.—St. John Sun.

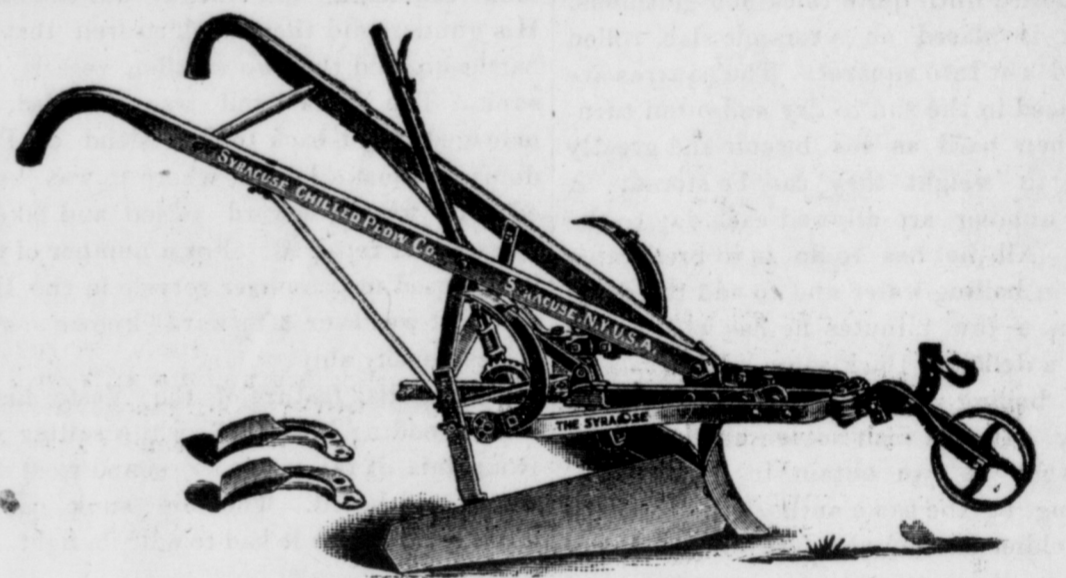

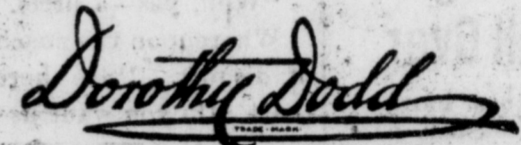
