THE TENTH FIELD BATTERY.

Will Compete With Other Canadian Batteries at Petewawa.

The field artillery practice camp meets at Petewawa, Ont., this month. The tenth field battery sent a contingent of eight gunlayers. They left Woodstock last night in order that they might arrive at camp in time for a few days practice before the competition which takes place on the 11th, and 12th and 13th of this month. Those who left last night were: William Drysdale, Arthur Fisher, Arthur Glidden, George Stoddard, Charles Stoddard, LeBaron Ingraham, Robert Curry and Herman MacLellan. On Saturday the 9th, the remainder of the attachment will leave here. This party will be composed of the following: Colonel Dibblee, Adjutant Loggie, Major Good, Captain Carvell, Captain Kirkpatrick, Lieutenants Fields and Gray, Sgt. Maj. Harold Gray, O. M. S. Milmore, Sergeants Hayden, Grant, Carvell and Jones and eight gunners, all of whom have not yet been selected.

At this annual practice camp the different field batteries throughout Canada are represented by a selected contingent from each corps. Prizes are given by the Canadian Artillery Association for competition in gunnery, gunlaying and general efficiency. The 10th Field Battery has always stood by its guns. It has never yet been compelled to take a seat among the back-benchers. In 1892 the 10th won the blue ribbon prize, the Governor General's prize and a cash prize of \$50.00. In 1901 the boys won the Oswald Challenge Cup. Some of the western batteries have made a better marching display, but when it came to the real old gunnery the boys have always held their own with all comers.

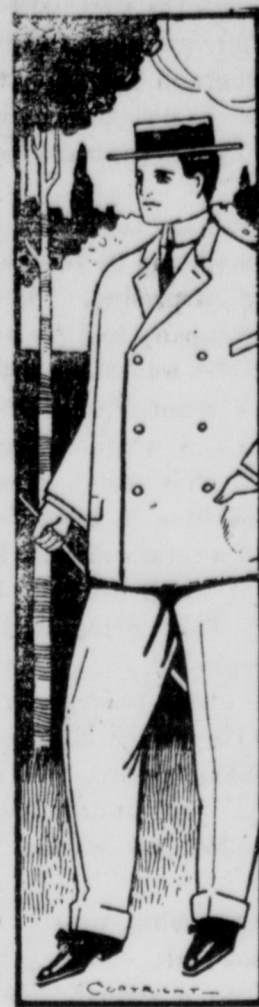
