The Wrecking of a World's Fair.

The work of demolishing the splendid buildings at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition is a colossal task, as indicated by the amount of material collected by the company which purchased the structures from the fair management. In a list sent out to prospective purchasers of the material no less than 100,000,000 feet of lumber is offered for sale comprising every kind and description, 50,000 sash, 10,000 doors, together with one million dollars' worth of copper wire, and other electrical material, vast quantities of pipe, fencing, roofing material, furniture, in fact, an aggregation of second hand goods such as never before was placed on the market. A novel feature is the offering of 25,000 bamboo poles used by the government in the Philippine Reservation, the last remnant of the manœuvring natives of Uncle Sam's new possession. The Home Barkeep's Guide.

It is the first duty of the Home Barkeep, every morning, to set the medicine cupboard to rights, with the various bottles of sarsaparilla, liver tonics, soothing syrups and vegetable compounds in plain view. He should then wash and polish his glasses, fill the sugar bowl, peel the lemons and slice the fruit. This done the kitchen blinds should be raised, that the village constable may have an unobstructed view. At 2 p. m. the front door and the family entrance should be closed promptly and not reopened unless some member of the family is taken with a pain during the night.

Sewing Circle Punch.—Use a teakettle Mix, per glass, 1-2 tablespoonful sugar, a thimbleful of lime juice, and a jigger of iags-prilla. Fill with ginger pop and stir with a knitting needle.

Silas Swallow.—Mix: 1-2 well-roasted or baked apple, 1-2 table-spoonful sugar, a jigger of Dr. Killequick's Vegetable Tonic. Fill with hot water and serve in a tall, straight sanctimonious glass.

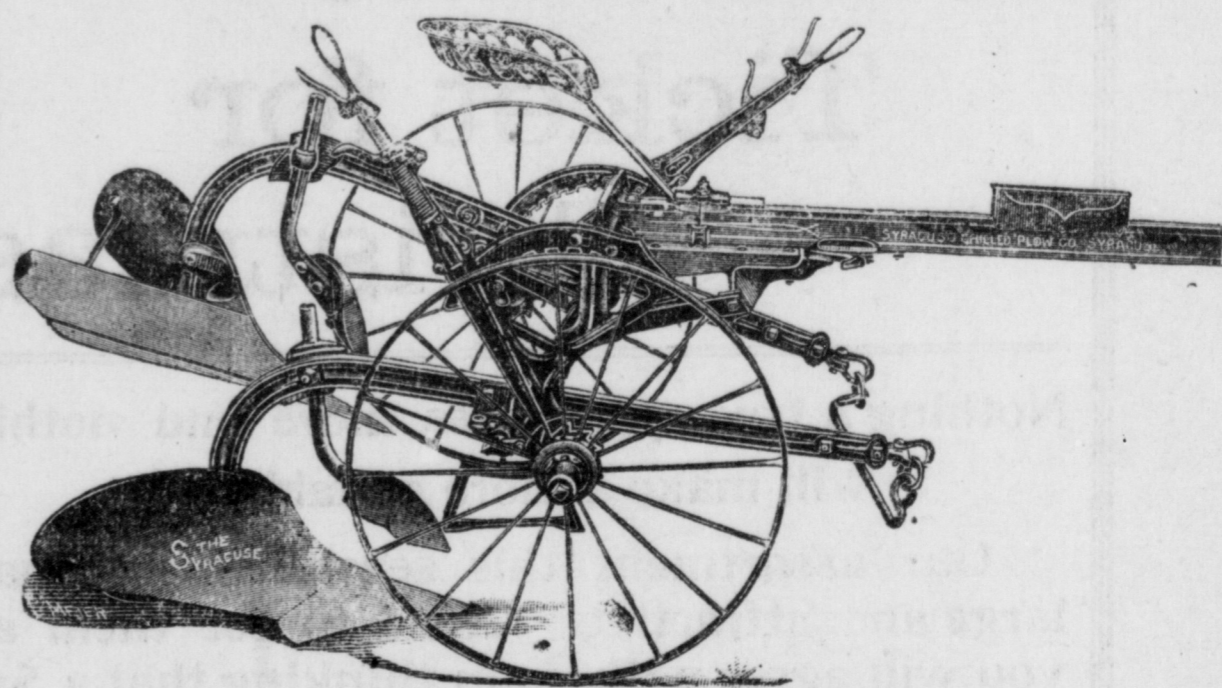
