

Death of William Mills.

On Wednesday there past away one of the oldest and most widely known residents of Carleton County in the death of William Mills of Middle Simonds. He was about 80 years of age and had been in failing health for some time. He is survived by his wife and one daughter, Mrs. Sandford Ingraham. The funeral was held at Simonds in the Adventist church; sermon by Rev. Mr. Burtt.

Mr. Mills was a native of Simonds and for many years conducted that old-time, wayside inn known as Mills Hotel. In the days of steam and tow-boating on this portion of the river, and when the old fashioned stagecoach made its semi-weekly trips between Woodstock and Andover, Mr. Mills did a thriving business. His was the favorite stopping place for them all. There is not a man living who traversed the Upper St. John Valley 40 years ago but remembers the cheer, the homely comfort, the warm hospitality of "Mills." But when the railway came and the boats and stage coaches disappeared the old hotel was no longer the place it had been. And in his last years the old gentleman lived a quiet, retired life.
