#### LEWIS PETER FISHER.

##### A Prominent Citizen Passes Away on Monday Morning.

Lewis Peter Fisher, K. C., one of the most prominent and wealthy citizens of the province died at his home here early Monday morning, at the age of 85 years.

Mr. Fisher was born at Fredericton in 1820. His father Peter Fisher was a native of the State of New Jersey but of German origin. Peter Fisher, sr., and his father were Loyalists and came to this province in 1783.

Lewis Peter Fisher was educated in private schools in Fredericton and studied Law with his brother Charles Fisher, who was afterwards a Judge of the Supreme Court.



He was admitted to the bar in 1841 and in the same year came to Woodstock where he has since resided. He opened a law office on Main street in a building standing back from the street near where H. E. Burt's store now is. He formed a law partnership with the late Randolph K. Jones which continued till 1875 in which year it was dissolved and in that year he formed a partnership with Mr. Allison B. Connell which continued till Mr. Fisher's death.

Mr. Fisher was a successful practitioner and in his early days was very successful in conducting the defence in criminal cases until the Fraser government came into power when he conducted the prosecution on behalf of the Crown.

Though he had not appeared in Court since 1884, yet until five or six years ago he had been actively engaged as a consulting Barrister. He was one of only two Barristers called within the bar before confederation.

Mr. Fisher married Miss De Mill of Richmond who survives him.

On the incorporation of the town of Woodstock in 1856 Mr. Fisher was elected Mayor, which office he held till 1880, a period of 24 years.

In 1865 he was appointed Judge of Probate, which office he held till his death. He was chairman of the board of school trustees, from 1872 to 1898. He was Superintendent of the Methodist Sunday School and leader of the choir for a period of 28 years.

Mr. Fisher is survived by his widow, one sister, Mrs. Isabel Smith and a large number of nieces and nephews living in Woodstock, Fredericton, St. John, Chatham, Moncton, Halifax and in some cities of the United States.

Mr. Fisher was a man of very great ability and he has filled a large place in the community. Though for some years he had retired from active participation in public affairs his death will be felt in no small way.

The funeral will be held from his late residence on Thursday afternoon at 2.30 p. m. The Rev. Geo. A. Ross and Rev. T. J. Deinstadt, of Fairville, will officiate. The Rev. Dr. Chapman, of Amherst, has also been notified. The members of the Barristers' Society and the School Board will attend. The remains will be interred in the Methodist cemetery.
