Heinze's Slick Trick.
When Clark needed Heinze's political support
in his fight for the senatorship he went
on Heinze's bond for \$1,000,000 in a suit
that the Butte and Boston company had
brought against Heinze. When Clark made
his alliance with the Amalgamated he went
before the supreme court and asked permission
to remove his name from the bond, which
request the supreme court denied. Shortly
afterward a suit was commenced against
Heinze in the supreme court in which he
was obliged to furnish a bond for \$700,000,
Clark was able by his influence to prevent
Heinze from getting any Montana men to
furnish this bond.

Great was the joy in the Amalgamated
camp that night. The "system" believed
that Heinze could not possibly get a bond
for such an immense sum and, as Heinze's
policy of expansion had involved every
dollar of his available capital, they stood
back with joyous hearts to await the crash.
The court would order his mines closed, his
smelter would shut down, his bank collapse
and Heinze would walk out of Butte dead
broke. To the amusement of "system,"
Heinze walked into the supreme court the
next morning and filed a bond for \$700,000,
given by the Washington (Del.) Bonding
and Casualty company and decorated with
the big golden seal of the state of Delaware.

Four months later, when Heinze had got
out of his tight place and was once more on
Easy street, the anger of the "system" can
be imagined when they learned how they
had been tricked. A month before Clark
betrayed Heinze in the supreme court, Heinze
who was watching for signs, and sensed what
was coming, walked into his office in a towering
rage one day and summarily discharged
five of his clerks and bookkeepers. They
disappeared with \$25,000 of Heinze's money
but speedily arrived in Wilmington, Del.,
where they opened magnificent offices and
applied to the proper authorities for the
right to do business. This was granted, but
all the business they were did was to send
a beautiful bond, a triumph of the engraver's
art, to their employer when he telegraphed
for it. The supreme court called Heinze
into its august presence and lectured him
severely. Heinze listened gravely, though
there are people who say that he had a cat
that swallowed the canary look in his eyes
while the venerable jurist was speaking.—
Tom Watson's Magazine.

New Bedford whalers, who have recently
returned from their annual poaching expedi-
tions to Hudson Bay, are loud in their com-
plaints against the Canadian authorities for
interfering with them. They say they were
pursued, harassed and fined by Dominion
patrol vessels, denied the privilege of rading
with the natives, and compelled to observe
Canadian customs and other laws. The New
Bedford people have enjoyed free fishing,
free whaling and free trading in the waters
and on the shores of Hudson Bay so long
that they imagine they have a right to these
privileges. It was only within the present
year that our government undertook to

police the Bay and its shores, regulate the
fisheries, and put a stop to illicit trading,
especially that in whiskey. The officials
charged with these duties appear to have
done their work well, there being no question
of jurisdiction, as the whole Bay is enclosed
by Canadian territory. Yet the New Bed-
ford whalers want their government to take
up their case against Canada. The absurdity
of their claim will probably be realized by
the United States government if it should
turn out that these men have been smuggling
both ways. It is smuggling to take fish in
Canadian waters and bring them into the
United States duty free. Certainly it would
be smuggling to purchase anything from
Canadians and bring it in duty free. This
demand will also appear as singular to all
who know how strictly all United States
territories and waters are guarded from the
intrusion of foreigners.

What a Labor Man Thinks of Trade Unions.

William D. Haywood, Secretary of the
Western Federation of Miners, and one of
the leading spirits in the formation of the
Industrial Union, which is intended to take
in members of all the working classes, says
that trades unions are as much out of place
in this day and age as the pony express and
the stage coach.

"Trade unions," he says, "are nothing
more or less than a labor monopoly. They
are trusts just as much as the Standard Oil
and Sugar trusts. They attempt to restrict
the supply of labor in order, as they think
to hold up wages. Through the apprentice
system they are making tramps of hundreds
of young men by denying them the right to
learn a trade. They attempt to dictate to
employers whom they shall hire and how
much they shall pay. They do not permit
employers to give young men a chance to
better their conditions.

"The American Federation of Labor people
say the American labor union is too
radical. It is due to the fact that we have
been holding up the trades unions until we
are tired of it." Haywood's statements have
caused a sensation in labor circles.—San
Francisco Call.

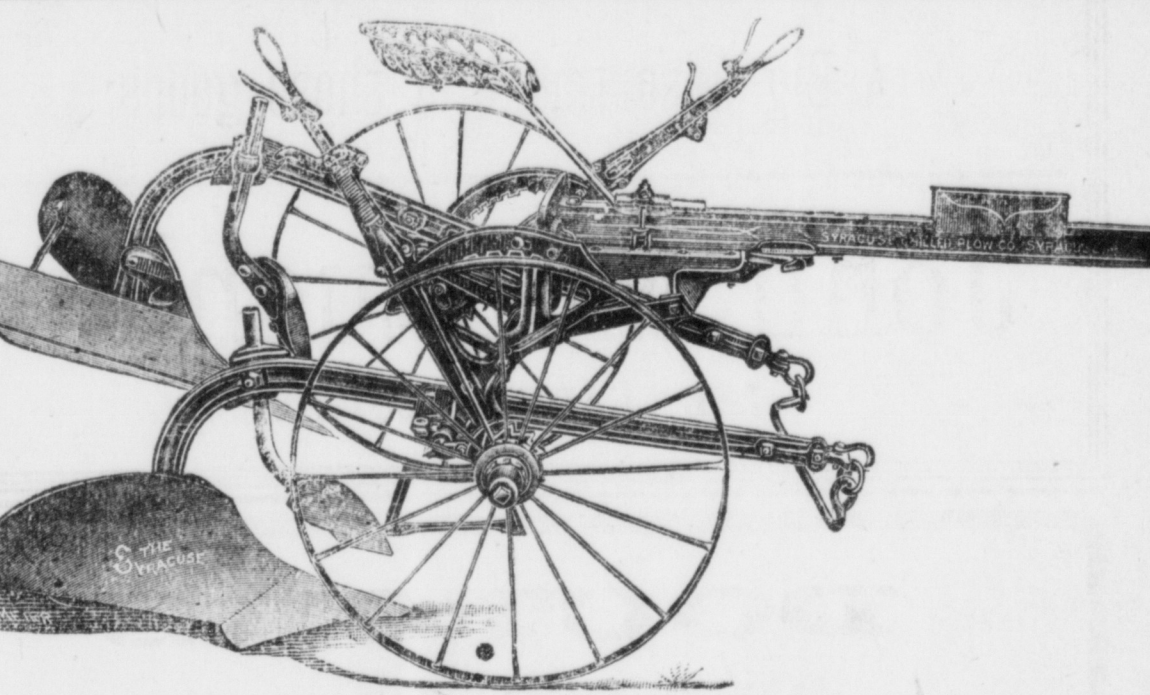
