LAID TO REST.

Remains of the Late C. W. Jenner Interred at Calais With Solemn Ceremony.

The death of C. Wm. Jenner, which was briefly recorded last week, was due to apoplexy, with which he was stricken while in his office at Eastport. A caller found him nearly unconscious. He was conveyed to his home but soon passed out on the last long voyage.

For a number of years he was employed in St. Stephen with the old New Brunswick and Canada Railway and afterwards was a valued employe with Small & Fisher in Woodstock for many years.

A few years ago he removed to Eastport and opened a lumber business which was growing rapidly.

Wm. Jenner was a man of upright life and kindly character and commanded the respect and esteem of a wide circle of acquaintances. A wife, son and daughter survive him. His mother and two sisters, Mrs. W. J. Fowler of Calais and Mrs. Geo. Frost of Milltown, also survive.

His remains were brought to Mrs. Fowler's home, from where the funeral was held on Friday afternoon, under the auspices of St. Stephen encampment, Knights Templar, of which he was a member, the Eastport and Calais commanderies participating.

He was a member of the Masonic lodge at Woodstock, which was represented by Brotheas Munroe, McKenzie, Kyle, Fisher and Hagerman.

The pall bearers were J. T. Whitlock, A. Mungall, W. W. Inches, A. L. Saunders, J. L. Thompson and Mr. Hocks.

The procession was an imposing one and headed by the Milltown cornet band.

Dr. Vose, Prelate, and J. D. Chapman, Commander, performed the Knights Templar service at the grave, the first occasion on which that service had been used here.—St. Croix Courier.
